Welfare Schemes of Punjab Govt. are implemented for teaching and non-teaching staff and students of the college. The college ensures that the medical expenses of the staff are timely reimbursed. Regular employees of the college are covered under the GIS. Process for award of scholarships to various categories of students is also facilitated as per the government norms.

7. Innovations and Best Practices

7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.

The college hosted National Conference on Post Reforms Developments in Capital Market in India with the help of UGC's assistance under career guidance component.

50 delegates from various colleges, hundred post graduates students of Commerce and Economics and fifty students of B.Com III participated in the seminars.

The inaugural session of the seminar was presided over by Dr. Raghbir Singh Professor and former Dean of Deaprtment of Commerce and Business Management of GNDU, Amritsar. Keynote address for the seminar was presented by Professor JS Pasricha, Deptt. Of Commerce Pbi. Uni. Patiala. Prof. Raghbir Singh presented details of the developments in the Indian Capital Market, in the country after the reforms era.

The first technical session was chaired by Prof. BK Vashisht, chairman University Business School, Punjab University, Chandigarh and Prof. Jaspal Singh of Deptt. Of Commerce and Management, GNDU Amritsar. Delegates from various colleges presented their research papers, which were followed by useful discussion and interaction among the resource persons and delegates.

Prof. Manjit Singh, Head Deptt. Of Applied Management, Punjabi University, Patiala, Prof. Satish Soni from Govt. College, Hamirpur (Himachal Pardesh) and Prof. Sawinder Singh from Guru Nanak College, Phaghwara chaired the second technical session. The chairperson and co-chairpersons gave detailed description of the development in the secondary market in India. After the deliberations from the chairpersons, research papers were presented by the delegates followed by useful discussion and interaction. The session was concluded with vote of thanks by Prof. T R Basra, co-coordinator of the Seminar. On the whole, this seminar enriched the delegates regarding recent developments in the Capital Market in India.

The post graduate students of our college got an exposure to National Conference and had an opportunity to interact with renowed speakers from different universities and colleges

7.2 Provide the Action Taken Report (ATR) based on the plan of action decided upon at the beginning of the year

Action Taken Report

- Students were admitted to various courses on merit basis as per the guidelines of Guru Nank Dev University, Amirtsar and Punjab Government norms.
- Technology facilitated teaching aids were used by the faculty members for improvement in quality of teaching and learning outcomes.
- Backside of administrative office was furnished with ceiling of fibre sheets with the help of self generated resources. This facility was provided keeping in view the conventence of the students while dealing with the office.
- Laboratories were furnished with required equipments and other essentials for smooth conduct of the practicals and hence contributed towards quality of teaching and learning outcomes.
- Infrastructure of the college and basic facilities were maintained with the help of Govt. Funds and self-generated resources.
- Strenuous efforts were made to get the grant sanctioned from Punjab Government for renovation of Chemistry Block, Room No. 89 of U-Block, Veranda of U-Block, and Construction of new Class Rooms, Common Room and Washroom for students.
- The faculty members made serious efforts for participation of students in university youth festival, inter-college competitions and sports events. Self-generated resources were utilised to facilitate the participation of students in various extra curricular activities.
- NSS units, Red Cross Society and Environment Society of the college took special initiative for participation of students in community servicing and environment sensitisation.

- Remedial classes were arranged for weak students particularly from socially and economically backward section of society.
- Efforts were made to access Govt. grants for renovation of building and construction of Common Room for girls and classrooms to increase the carrying capacity of the institution.
- Backside of administrative office was furnished with a shed supported by fibre sheets to facilitate the convenience of students while dealing with the office.
- Efforts were made for upkeep of the infrastructure with the help of self-generated funds from PTA and SFS.
- Alumni Association of the college were motivated to provide basic amenities in the college and consequently safe drinking water was made available to the students by installing RO system in the college canteen.

7.4 Contribution to environmental awareness / protection

- 1. Environment society of the college undertook special initiatives to create awareness among the students for maintaining safe environment. Students were assigned responsibility to take care of the new saplings. Students were also motivated to remove needs from the college lawns and grounds.
- 2. The environment society also inspired the students to celebrate eco-friendly Diwali by displaying posters depicting the hazards of crackers. Moreover, they also undertook oath for no burning crackers and use traditional modes of celebrations.
- 3. Tree plantation drive in the campus was launched by NSS units of the college for protection of environment.

Detail of SWOT analysis

- Oldest Institution The college was established in 1856 and has the distinction of being affiliated to the Calcutta University, Punjab University, Chandigarh and finally with Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar.
- 2. Location and landed area our institution is located in the middle of the city with a vast landed area. It has an area of 33 acres and constructed area of about 7000 sq. mater. It is well connected to other towns and villages.
- 3. Well qualified available faculty The permanent faculty members of the college are well qualified having appointed on merit basis with vast experience of about 20 years each. Out of total 29 permanent teaching staff, 12 members hold doctorate degree and have a number of published papers to their credit.
- 4. Merit positions of the students The College is affiliated to Guru Nanak Dev University Amritsar. The students secure merit positions in the examination conducted by the University.

- 5. Co-Curricular activities The College has its name in the cultural and sports activities. The students represent the college in inter-college competitions, zonal and inter-zonal youth festival of GNDU, Amritsar and secure positions in various cultural items.
- 6. Lowest Fee Structure The College has the lowest fee structure (framed by the Govt. of Punjab) as compared to other private institutions. It is especially helpful for the lower economic strata of the society.
- 7. Support of Parent Teacher Association and Self Finance Scheme- the College has financial support from PTA and SFS for maintenance of infrastructure and provosion of basic facilities to the students.
- 8. Support of Old Students Association –Association of Old Students of the college is very active and their financial support is worth mentioning. The association undertakes various projects from time to time keeping in view the needs of the students.

Weaknesses:

- 1. Faculty Shortage Nearly 50% of the teaching and non-teaching posts are vacant in the college. Guest faculty teachers are appointed on these posts and this is not a healthy feature of an educational institution.
- 2. Dilapidated Infrastructure The College has the shortage of required modern furniture, classrooms, teaching aids and laboraty equipments.
- 3. Library The college library has no required space for reading room. There is shortage of staff, latest library equipments, software and computers.
- 4. Absence of new/latest courses Due to shortage of faculty and equipments, the college is not able to introduce latest courses and is not able to change the course content as required by emerging changes in the economic scenario.
- 5. Shortage of supporting staff- There is shortage of supporting staff in library, laboratories and administrative office which affects this over-all efficiency.

Opportunities

- Expansion of the Institution Having a vast area of 33 acre of prime land in the heart of the city, the college has the scope of expansion in the infrastructure and building required to accommodate new courses and students.
- Latest Professional courses at minimum possible cost The College has the potential of starting latest professional courses at minimum possible cost provided it has the required permanent staff and essential infrastructure.
- Sports Hub The College can be developed as a sports hub in the area.
- Research Projects The faculty members can be engaged in research projects provided they are enriched with required modern equipments of research like separate rooms, software, computer and internet facility.
- Consultancy services As a liaison of the institution with local industry, the faculty members can provide consultancy services to the industry.

Threats

- Vacant Posts Vacant Posts in the institution in teaching, non-teaching and subordinate staff is a threat to the institution. It affects the quality of teaching.
- Lack of latest courses The College lacks in providing latest courses to the students.
- Infrastructure –The existing infrastructure is dilapidated and unable to support the modern courses.

8. Plans of institution for next year

Plan of Action:-

- 1. To strength the college infrastructure with the help of financial assistance from Punjab Government.
- 2. To equip the laboratories with latest equipments to enhance the quality of teaching and learning outcomes.
- 3. To seek further grants from UGC and effective utilization of the available grants.
- 4. To provide technological aids to the faculty member for more effective classroom teaching.
- 5. To further motivate the faculty members to undertake research initiatives in their respective areas of interest.
- 6. To increase the participation of students in sports and other co-curricular activities for over-all personality development of the students.
- 7. To motivate the students for greater participation in community works through NSS units and Red Cross Society of the college.
