#### **Executive Summary (SWOC Analysis)**

Nawab Jassa Singh Ahluwalia Government College, erstwhile known as Randhir College, Kapurthala, one of the oldest institution in the region, has transformed itself from most humble beginning as Sanskrit Vidyalya and named Randhir School in the year 1856 by the visionary ruler of Kapurthala, His Highness Raja Randhir Singh, into one of the most vibrant and monumental college. It happens to be the same year in which three Universities in Calcutta, Madras and Bombay were established under the New Education Policy based on the Woods' Dispatch of 1854. The students used to sit under a Peepal tree, where a Havan Kund was erected and education was imparted in the traditional Guru-Shishya Parampara. This 200 year old Peepal tree still adorns the College premises. Four languages, Urdu, Persian, Sanskrit and English were taught in the premises. Besides, Sanskrit education of Priyjna, Visharad and Shashtri was taught up to matriculation standard. Till the year of 1882, when Punjab University Lahore was set up, it remained affiliated to the Calcutta University. Being the only institution of higher learning in the region, the students from other Princely States and neighbouring British Ruled Districts of Jullundur and Hoshiarpur were also studying here, whose number had swelled to 280 by 1978-79. Most of these students were staying in the boarding. The institution made rapid strides in the field of education under the able guidance of three European Principals, Mr.Hudsen, Mr.A.R.Wood and Mr.A.W.Healy till the year 1890 as Maharaja was a minor and the control of the State was in the hands of English Administrators.

On assuming active control in 1890, His Highness Maharaja Jagatjit Singh started taking keen interest in the education system of the State and raised it to intermediate college in 1896. The subjects of Natural Sciences were also added to the curriculum of the College during this period. The Maharaja, having a great love for French, introduced the language in the College in 1916 and this became the only institution teaching French in the region. To accommodate the rising number of students, a new U-shaped building was constructed around old *Peepal* tree, consisting of modern day classrooms and verandas in the year 1912, commemorating the visit of His Highness, the King Emperor of India and was inaugurated on April 7, 1913 by Sir Louis Dane, the then Lieutenant Governor of Punjab. This building is known as U-block and the classes are held in this block even today; with the old *Peepal* tree still being intact and witness to the old as well as the modern methods of teaching in unison.

Taking further strides, degree classes in Arts and Science were started in 1946 and the College became a Post-Graduate institution in 1976 by introducing M.A. English. At present, the College has Post-Graduation in three subjects viz., English, Economics and Commerce. Three new courses, PGDCA, B.Sc. (Computer Science) and B.Sc. (Economics) have been introduced in 2006 on Self-Finance basis.

The history of school and then College has been an arduous journey. We laud the efforts of our founder and all the visionary Principals for their strong stewardship. They worked with great fortitude, facing vicissitudes and financial constraints, and successfully established the College. It has since then forged ahead, meeting new challenges in the education system with new technology. Today, in 2015, the College has the strength of approximately 2,015 students.

In cognizance of the recommendations made by NAAC Peer Team in the year 2004, we have earnestly strived to fortify our strengths and to overcome our weaknesses in honest introspection.

The SWOC Analysis of our institution for the period under NAAC analysis 2010-2014 is presented below:

- Our sprawling, spacious 33 acre campus with lush green lawns, well lit & ventilated classrooms surrounded by idyllic, scenic beauty forms a conducive ambience for the holistic development of students. The age old trees have been witness to the growth of our college from its humble beginning as Sanskrit Vidyalya in 1856, when the founding fathers envisaged the college as an instrument for the realisation of a bold vision that aimed at providing quality education to people of remote regions.
- Our Institution resolutely advocates inclusive education and equity for all irrespective of their financial, lingual and academic background. Students are charged nominal fees, admission procedure is merit based and all other aspects are performed in accordance to the Punjab government reservation policy and GNDU, Amritsar. Educational needs of the socio/economically challenged strata of society are met by allocating 25%, 5% & 2% seats to the SC, BC, Physically challenged/ Defence Personnel/Sports persons respectively. The achievement of educational inclusion is evident from increase in proportion of SC/BC category students from 47.1% in 2012-13 to 58.7% in 2013-14. These students are also part of merit position holders of the University and actively participate in various co-curricular activities.
- The College has highly qualified and competent faculty members. The dedicated faculty of the College comprising 23 Permanent, 7 Part-timers and 26 Guest Faculty, work diligently to ascertain high academic standards and global competence in the students. Various faculty members in the College contribute a lot in promotion of research. Most of the faculty members of our College have a good number of research publications to their credit and have also organized/participated and presented papers in various research seminars and workshops at national level. The teaching learning process moves beyond the confines of the class rooms and teachers willingly make themselves available to the students even after the mandatory teaching sessions.

- The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college has been recently set up, which plays a vital role in ensuring quality in education through various quality enhancement measures and monitoring mechanisms.
- To facilitate the academic, co-curricular and sports activities, our institution has an effectual infrastructure-
  - 28 Classrooms, 02 Lecture Theatres, 02 Smart Classrooms, 03 Extra-large Rooms, Laboratories for practical subjects.
  - Well-equipped Laboratories of Science, Home Science, Geography, Music, Computer Science departments.
  - To strengthen the teaching-learning process the college is equipped with latest technological tools such as overhead projectors, Multimedia Projectors.
- The College offers a lot of support to its staff for making the learning process student centric. The College encourages the use of internet and computers by the staff and students to keep them abreast of the latest developments in their respective fields of study.
- In addition to a well-stocked Library, our College also has separate Post-graduate and Departmental libraries.
- The Botanical Garden and well-maintained lawns are home to a rare species of flora and fauna.
- The vast Playground to train the students in sports like Basketball, Volleyball, Cricket, Kabbadi so as to prepare them to compete in University, State, National and International competitions.

#### Weaknesses:

- Existence of vacant regular posts of teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Inability to introduce new courses as per the emerging scenario due to vacant posts of staff.
- The College Library has insufficient space for reading room, shortage of staff, latest library equipment and computers.
- College Jubilee Hall is in dilapidated state and hence unsafe to be used for cultural or examination purposes.

- Expansion of Institution Having a vast area of 33 acres prime land in heart of the city, the College has scope of expansion.
- Latest professional courses at minimum possible cost The College has potential of starting latest professional courses provided it has the required permanent staff.
- Sports Hub The College can be developed as a sports hub in the area.

- Research projects The teachers can be engaged in research projects provided they are enriched with required modern equipment of research like separate rooms and advanced learning resources.
- Consultancy Services As liaison of the Institution with local industry, the faculty members can provide consultancy services to the industry.





# **1.1.2** How does the Institution develop and deploy action for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

Our Institution deploys the following well-chalked out action plan for effective implementation of the prescribed curriculum.

- **Time Table**: At the beginning of each academic session, the Academic Calendar along with the time table for Arts, Commerce, Science streams is prepared according to the number of elective subjects and the options offered to the students, the number of periods devoted to each subject per week and the same is displayed on the Staff and Student Notice Board.
- **Creation of Sections**: Sections are made in accordance with the subject combination and the student strength.
- Unitization of the curriculum: At the beginning of the academic sessions, meetings at departmental level are done for proper division of syllabus in accordance with the number of terms in a session.
- The schedule of work is duly allotted to the respective teachers for smooth and effective drift of syllabus.
- The teachers acquaint the students with the prescribed course content, texts and recommend relevant books, Students are also encouraged to be regular, attentive and perform well.
- For getting better understanding, pattern of the University paper is made clear to the students.

- **Problem solving and query clearance sessions**: Apart from the successful completion of the curriculum, adequate time is devoted for resolving problems and queries are readily cleared during the sessions. Our competent and dedicated faculty members impart the best of moral and academic guidance and training to our students. For proficiency in skill courses, our teachers dwell at length on the extensive explanation of the fundamental aspects for the students understanding and comprehension.
- **Teacher feedback**: The performance of the students is gauged by means of Internal House Test conducted in the month of December in Annual System and in the month of October in Semester System. Along with the house test, class tests are also conducted to ascertain the students' proficiency level.
- Internal Monitoring Mechanism: Our Institution has an internal monitoring mechanism of proctorial duties, whereby team of five teachers ensures that classes are being met on regular basis to promote discipline, efficiency and regularity.
- Regular periodic departmental meetings are held to review the progression of the syllabus.
- Proper steps are taken to ensure minimum absenteeism.

# 1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and /or Institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

- The University extends support to teachers in the form of UGC sponsored Refresher/ Orientation courses and seminars, subject related workshops which are highly relevant and beneficial, as they provide an opportunity to imbibe new and advanced teaching learning practices.
- The acquired knowledge in these courses are subsequently implemented at the classroom level by motivating students to participate in interactive sessions such as group discussions and seminars, and group work activities-which would serve in strengthening students learning skills and would help in developing research aptitude.

# **1.1.4** Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the Institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University of the other statutory agency.

The initiatives taken up for effective curriculum delivery and transaction are as follows:

- **Smart classrooms**: Our Institution has introduced modern teaching techniques such as multi-media projectors for undergraduate and postgraduate classes.
- Audio visual aids are used to fortify the teaching learning process.
- The theory portion of science and other practical subjects is supplemented with practical sessions as per University norms.
- Optimum use of the College Library and Internet Facility: Teachers adequately supplement classroom teaching with relevant resource and reference material procured from books, journals available in the library or downloaded from the internet. This is provided to the students as notes, followed by explanation and detailed discussion. This practice is adopted primarily in PG classes and elective subjects, and Sanskrit Honours classes.
- Field Visits: For optimum curriculum delivery and for the special element of verisimilitude, field visits are organised, for instance: students of Commerce, Arts and Science visited Science city, Kapurthala, Shri Naina Devi Temple, Hari ke Pattan, Chattbir zoo and historical city of Anandpur Sahib, where they gathered historical facts and became aware of implementation of technology, audio-visual aids that highlight the rich heritage and culture effectively; Post Graduate students of (English) and students of History, Music, Political Science, etc visited holy city Amritsar, and paid their homage at the sacred shrine- Golden Temple, Durgiana Temple and Jallianwala Bagh-site of gruesome massacre, Wagah Border. To gain awareness and sensitivity to environment and its challenges, students are taken to Seechewal, Sultanpur Lodhi. These visits help to enrich their experiences with firsthand knowledge, values, skills, critical and scientific thinking.
- Student Interactive Activities: To foster intellectual agility, chisel the ability to articulate with democratic outlook; teachers encourage the students to actively participate in group discussions and debates, seminars, paper reading sessions. Postgraduate students are given assignments and are also encouraged to give presentations, offering unique opportunities for learning which also help in developing their communication skills.
- **Trilingual Method:** Owing to student's diverse academic backgrounds, acquisition level varies; the trilingual method is adopted, for it enables the relatively slow paced learners towards better understanding and clarity of concepts.
- **Remedial Classes**: Special attention is paid to weak students by way of remedial classes which not only strengthens their hold on the subject but also improves their overall academic performance in the University Exams.

• **Class Tests/ Assignments**: Class tests/Assignments are administered on regular basis to assess the learner level. Students' learning is strengthened through other interactive sessions such as group discussions, debates, seminars, asking MCQ in class competitions etc.

### **1.1.5** How does Institution network interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the University in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

For effective operationalization of the prescribed curriculum, our Institution network with the beneficiaries as follows:

- The College has set up a `Career Guidance and Counselling Cell' which maintains professional relations with the representatives, experts, and research bodies. Our College organizes talks and seminars during every session in collaboration with the District Employment Office, Kapurthala, to inform the students of different prospects for their careers.
- The faculty members of the College keep in touch with the departments in University, and keep visiting University from time to time to keep abreast with latest trends in their field. They also subscribe to the journals and magazines/ Newsletters published by various teaching departments.
- Students of Music, visit several national and state-level seminars and stage shows, organised by Shri Baba Harivallabh Sangeet Maha Sabha, and various seminars at H.M.V. College, Jalandhar, D.A.V. College, Batala, G.N.D.U. Amritsar. Our students gain a lot at Shri Baba Harivallabh Sangeet Sammelan, Jalandhar, where musicians of national and international fame perform.
- Special Orientation Programme for preparing the students to appear in competitive examinations is held every year by experts and scholars.
- All departments and Subject Societies organise guest lectures by resource persons from the University and Research Institutes with expertise in their areas of research for the benefit students. The lectures are thought provoking, enriching and ennobling.


The Institution ensures that the stated objectives of the curriculum are achieved through the following measures:

Various Institutional provisions and concessions with reference to the academic flexibility are extended to the students in the following areas:

Time Frame Mobility – students unable to complete an academic programmeundergraduate and post graduate due to various reasons, viz., financial constraints, medical emergencies or adverse family circumstances, can resume their course with an affidavit justifying the time gap, within the stipulated period of time prescribed by the University. This time frame flexibility facilitates the student's progression to higher studies despite the gap.

Total 15 Elective subjects are offered by the Institution according to the posts of teachers sanctioned by the Higher Education authorities of the Govt. of Punjab.

#### Choice Based Credit System: N.A.

- Range of subject options: In Humanities stream for UG classes, in addition ot two compulsory subjects, viz., General English and General/Basic Punjabi, students have to opt for three more elective subjects out of the subjects of two paper ( one paper in first semester and another in second) and carries 100 marks each.

- Vertical Mobility Within and across programmes/courses, students from Arts, Science and Commerce streams, can opt for post-graduation degree in English, Economics and Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Applications (PGDCA).
- Horizontal Mobility Students have the facility to change their elective subjects after their admission within a stipulated period of time, with due permission from their respective subject teachers.
- Enrichment Courses Along with regular academic programme in Arts, Commerce and Science stream, the Institution offers enrichment courses like Music instruments and vocal, Home Science and PGDCA.

- P. STEP Programme It was sponsored by Higher Education Department Govt. of Punjab and was organized by Punjab Infotech – in which training in IT, Communication and soft skills was provided.
- To promote the all-round development of the students' personality and mental growth, our Institution has organized National Conference and Workshop, Seminars, Guest lectures and field visits during each academic session.

- The admission process for self-finance courses is the same as per regular academic programmes. Applications are invited; merit list is prepared according to the number of seats in the course. The reservation policy of the Govt. is also implemented for admission in all classes.
- > The curriculum for the self-financed courses is prepared by the affiliating University.
- As the courses are self-financed with no financial support from the Govt., the fee structure is marginally higher than fee for the regular courses.
- Teachers are recruited through HEIS, and preference is given to the qualified candidates.
- > The salary structure is as per policy framed by HEIS.

- As a Government Institution, the College offers a subsidized education to the underprivileged students owing to its moderate fee structure and reservation of seats. The Affiliating University (Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar) formulates the course structure and syllabus in which the Institution plays the major role with the help of our senior faculty members. The faculty members prepare lesson plan to ensure timely and effective completion of the course. It is supplemented by organizing the group discussion, academic extension lectures, seminars and conferences so that the students can be better equipped to forge their place in the highly competitive job market.
- The focus of the College always remains on quality education and the holistic development of the students, so they are provided with the atmosphere conducive for their all-round personality development. They are encouraged to participate in an array of academic, like essay writing, quiz contest, poem writing and extracurricular activities. To boost the motivation of the students, they are honoured for their academic excellence, cultural activities and sports.

- The goal of the Institution is to enhance equity for which efforts are made. For the benefit of girl students, SC/BC and academically weak students, special remedial classes are arranged with the help of UGC fund, RUSA fund.
- Students who are aspiring to clear UGC-NET and other competitive examinations, extra coaching is given with the grants received from RUSA fund. The faculty members guide their students for this purpose after their class times.
- To offer flexibility and diversity to the students and to equip them with multiple skills, a sense of discipline, responsibility and companionship is inculcated among them.

# **1.3.2.** What are the efforts made by the Institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

- The syllabus and curriculum is framed by the affiliating University (Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar) and the Institution follows it strictly. However, it is organized and enriched through various orientation programmes/Seminars/Conferences/ Group Discussion so as to enhance the prospects of employability of the students in the highly competitive and ever changing job market. The following efforts have been made by the College for this purpose:
- A Two Day Workshop of 'Soft Skills and Personality Development' was organized on January 20-21, 2011 by 'Career Counselling and Guidance Cell' of the College. This workshop played a proactive role in directing the students in the right direction as their individual acumen and aspiration. Special efforts are made by this Cell to guide the students for employment with the help of District Employment Office, Govt. of Punjab. Special lectures are arranged from District Employment office for this purpose.
- A National Seminar was organized by PG Department of Commerce on September 14, 2012 on the theme 'Post Reforms Developments in Indian Capital Market'. Delegates from various Colleges and Students of Commerce and Economics department participated in the seminar. This seminar was fruitful for students and teachers about the recent developments in Indian Capital Market.
- Extension lectures are arranged by different departments with University teachers and experts as resource persons to develop the interest of the students in the subject and to prepare them to appear in competitive examinations.

**1.3.3.** Enumerate the efforts made by the Institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

- The College is proactive in sensitizing the students regarding cross-cutting issue like Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum. Numerous orientation programmes and awareness drives are organized from time to time for the benefit of students.
- Gender Sensitization Special lectures are organized from time to time. Students are made aware of the issues like Domestic Violence Act, Female Foeticide, Dowry, Sexual abuses and sexual harassment etc. The College has constituted Women Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti ragging Squad and Discipline Committee for the help of girls and boys.
- Climate Change keeping in mind the climate changes in the region, the College has set up Environmental and Science Society. Every year, the society organizes programmes to make students aware of the climate changes by arranging lecture on pollution awareness, conservation of natural resources and arranging poster making competition on these issues. It also urges the students to celebrate pollution free Diwali and other occasions and oath is administered to students for this purpose.
- Environment Education Environment education is an integral part of the prescribed curriculum at under-graduate level and is compulsory to pass the examination in the second year of the course. In addition to this, we have green campus along with Botanical Garden and a vermicompost unit. Our Science and Environmental Society, Alumni, Green Glade Group, National Service Scheme (NSS) unit as well as faculty members promote tree plantation and up keeping of College gardens to keep the College campus cool, green, pollution free and rich in oxygen. The relevance of Environment Day is reaffirmed by celebrating Van Mahaotsav Day every year and the students of the College adopt sapling and nurture them with great care.
- Human Rights Our Grievances and Redressal Cell monitors the problems of students. They are encouraged to discuss their problems with their respective teachers or by putting their complaints in the Grievances Box. Their problems are discussed and redressal is ensured.

The Anti-ragging Committee of the College ensures that not a single ragging incident take place in the campus.

- Boys and Girls NSS and NCC units of the College donate blood in Blood Donation Camps and participate in rallies regarding social issues of HIV-Aids awareness, Drug abuses and road Safety awareness etc.
- Information and Communication Technology (ICT) To meet the challenges of computer age, the College is equipped with modern techniques of teaching and learning. We have courses like B.Sc. (Computer Science), B.Sc. (Economics) and Post Graduate Diploma in Computer Applications (PGDCA) for this purpose. Besides this, College has fully equipped smart classrooms where the conceptual, theoretical parts of the curriculum are taught with the use of Audio-visual techniques of teaching. The College has a number of LCD Projectors for teaching through power point presentations.

- Equal emphasis is given to the academic as well as holistic development of the students so as to ensure that they become productive members of society.

Along with the prescribed curriculum, moral and ethical values are imparted by attempting to break the age-old shackles of gender disparity in view of rising crime against women. Students are apprised about important issues like human rights, care for old etc. in their classrooms.

 NSS units nurture the spirit of social service, dignity of labour and fellow feeling among the students. On the other hand, NCC imparts military training and inculcates a sense of discipline. Both these wings make efforts to hold awareness drives regarding Blood Donation, Adult Literacy, Women Empowerment, Cleanliness and Environment Preservation etc.

#### Employable and life skills

• With the focus on the personality development of the students, various contests like essay writing, story writing, poem writing, debates and declamations are organized in the College. Every year, the Youth Welfare Department of the University organizes zonal and inter-zonal youth festival for the students of the affiliated Colleges. The

College takes part in a number of items so that the students undergo holistic personality development to stand with the time.

### Better career options

- Career Counselling and Guidance Cell functions as the bridge between the students and their prospective employment opportunities. It makes the students aware of the various employment opportunities according to their aptitude and qualification by organizing lectures of different experts. Special efforts are made by this Cell to guide the students for employment with the help of District Employment Office, Govt. of Punjab.
- A workshop on `Soft Skills and Personality Development' was organized for the students for directing them in the right direction as their individual acumen and aspiration.

### **Community orientation**

- For community orientation, the College celebrates `Van Mahotsav' by planting and owning saplings and making students aware about the environment change and the preservation of natural resources. Students are taught to preserve water and electricity etc.
- Students donated blood not only in the blood donation camps organized by the Red Cross Society but also readily donate blood whenever a call is received from the nearby hospitals.
- They took part in the AIDS awareness activities conducted by Red Ribbon Club.
- The Students of the Institution also perform voluntary service in Pulse Polio Campaign.

# **1.3.5.** Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The head and faculty of the Institution interact with the academic peers in the meetings in Seminars, Extension Lectures etc. The suggestions collected on informal basis are conveyed in the meetings of Board of Studies of the affiliating University for appropriate modifications in the curriculum.

• To monitor the quality of programme and to propose measures for improvement, the College has formed various committees like IQAC, Grievances and Redressal Cell, Library Committee etc. These are comprised of the senior faculty members.

• The Principal monitors the regularity and punctuality with the help of Staff Council, The time-table in charge, Discipline Committee and the Proctors.

The teachers conduct class tests on individual level. The performance of the students in these tests helps to monitor their progress in their respective course of study. The teachers also impart counselling to the students to overcome their weaknesses in different areas. They also help the students by giving important tips to prepare for the competitive examinations.

### 1.4. Feedback System

Many faculty members of the College are included as the member of our University Board of Studies, Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, Faculty of Economics and Business. They help to convey the demands of the students and peers of the College in the meetings at the University, thus involved in designing the curriculum.

### **2.1.1** How does the College ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

### Publicity in the Admission Process:

- Admission schedule as framed by affiliating University is incorporated in the Annual College Prospectus and implemented subsequently.
- College Prospectus is published about a month before the commencement of each academic session which contains all details about the College, its faculty members, rules and regulations for admission, admission dates and fee structure.
- Admission form is attached with the Prospectus and students are instructed to submit their duly filled admission forms in the College office within the stipulated period.
- College has its own website and desirous students can attain all sort of information regarding admission policy.
- Flex banners on the boundary wall of the College and notices on the College Notice Boards facilitate the students to get the required information regarding the admission process.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex.(i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by State Agencies and National Agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

### The admission process:

• The process of admitting the students to various programms/streams is carried out by way of a transparent and well - administered mechanism complying with all the norms of the Guru Nanak Dev University and DPI (Colleges) Punjab.

Admission to various Undergraduate and Post Graduate Courses is done on the basis of merit followed by interview keeping in view the eligibility criteria laid down by the University/Punjab Govt.

### **2.2 CATERING TO DIVERSE NEEDS OF STUDENTS:**

## **2.2.1.** How does the Institution caters to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

- Differently abled students are admitted to various courses in the College according to their reservation quota as instructed in Govt. policy.
- All teaching blocks have been equipped with ramps for the convenience of these students.

- Genuine efforts are made to adjust the classes of the differently-abled students on the ground floor.
- Students having some personal/psychological problems are motivated to discuss their problems with their teachers and the results are highly encouraging.
- The library staff helps the physically challenged students by issuing books on priority basis.
- Red Cross Society and Waheguru Club also extend financial assistance to these students.

# **2.2.2** Does the Institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes' give details on the process:

In our College, admission is done on merit basis. Members of the admission committee guide the students in selecting elective subjects according to their interest, aptitude and capability.

# 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the Institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment

### Courses, etc.)

- On the basis of the performance in class test and house examinations, the academically weak students are identified and additional guidance is imparted to them.
- To bridge the knowledge gap of weak students, Remedial Classes are arranged in their availability period.
- Special tests are especially conducted for these students to assess the learning outcomes of Remedial Classes.

# 2.2.4 How does the College sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

- In order to sensitize the staff and the students on different issues such as gender, inclusion and environment etc., various talks and seminars are organized in the College frequently.
- Van Mahotsav is celebrated every year to sensitize the students and the faculty on environmental issues.
- NSS and Red Cross Wings of the College sensitize the students on these issues and motivate them to extend a helping hand to the underprivileged sections of society.

• Science and Environment Society of the College organizes activities to spread awareness concerning environmental degradation and its prevention.

# 2.2.5 How does the Institution identify and respond to educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

- The Institution identifies the special educational learning needs of the advanced learners by organizing various class tests and creative writing competitions etc.
- Selected advanced learners are imparted valuable guidance and coaching in the teachers' availability timings.
- Competitive batches are also organized to cater to the needs of advanced learners.
- Special books of more advanced level are recommended to them.

2.2.6 How does the Institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

- The information on the academic performance of the students is obtained by the teachers through class room interactions, regular class tests, assignments and surprise test. These exercises help the teachers to identify slow learners and given special attention in the classrooms along with Remedial classes to check the drop out.
- Students from the disadvantaged and economically weaker sections are also enrolled in the Remedial Classes.
- In the beginning of each academic session, applications are invited from economically weaker sections of students and financial assistance is provided to them under different heads. Apart from this, students are also the beneficiaries of various types of scholarships extended by the government.
- College tries its level best to adjust the classes of physically challenged students on the ground floor.

### 2.3 Teaching - Learning Process

## **2.3.1** How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

• In the beginning of each academic session, College time-table is prepared for both under-graduate and post-graduate classes taking into consideration the number of students in each course.

- Frequent meetings are called by the heads of various departments for unitization of the syllabus designed by the University and to frame the teaching strategies for the academic session.
- Seminars and interactive session are arranged in the classes.
- Oral and written test are organized by all the faculty members at the end of each chapter or unit.
- According to University guidelines, one house test is conducted in each academic session to evaluate the performance of the students. In semester classes, Mid Semester Tests are conducted by the College.

### 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

- Internal Quality Assurance Cell contributes a lot in improving the teaching learning process of the College, thus enabling it to achieve academic excellence.
- Taking into consideration fast changing global scenario in the field of education, innovative teaching-learning methodology is implemented to upgrade the knowledge of the learners. Our College, under the guidance of DPI\* (Colleges) Punjab has, adopted the process of educating students through EDU- SAT. This visual class room learning offers new technology for supporting effective teaching in the College.
- All the laboratories of various departments like Physics, Chemistry, Computers, Geography and Home Science etc. are upgraded with the latest equipment and tools, to supplement theoretical knowledge of the learners with practical skills.
- Teachers use innovative teaching methodology like interactive sessions, projects, presentations and group discussions to enhance the knowledge of the students.
- The Principal, along with senior members of the faculty, ensures the regularity of the classes.
- Teachers evaluate the learning process of the students through class tests, oral tests, assignments and house tests which are organized and evaluated methodically and students are informed about their performance regularly.
- Students enrich their knowledge and prepare their assignments and questions with the help of books available in the College Library.
- The Institution ensures healthy teaching learning environment by maintaining proper discipline in the campus with the help of Proctorial Teams

# 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

• In order to make teaching more student-centric, teachers encourage active participation of the students in class-room interactive sessions. In their attempt to make their lectures highly motivating, they incorporate their lectures with audio-

visual aids, multi-media and over-head projectors. Various well-equipped Science, Computer Science, and Home Science laboratories allow the students to explore and experiment innovatively.

- Independent learning is developed especially among post-graduate students by encouraging them to prepare their assignments with the help of reference books of selected writers and critics. Teachers, on the other hand upgrade their knowledge by undertaking UGC sponsored refresher courses and orientation courses.
- Collaborative learning among the students is promoted through practical groups in case of laboratory based courses.
- Various Forums viz. NCC, NSS, Red-Cross Society and Subject Societies for group activities of the students also facilitate collaborative learning and community servicing among them.

## **2.3.4** How does the Institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into the life-long learners and innovators?

- To nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among students, the College faculty motivates them to participate in various inter-College, State and national level competitions in the field of academics, sports and cultural events.
- College endeavours to inculcate the sense of responsibility among students by assigning them different duties during functions organized by various Societies and Clubs of the College.
- The Institution organizes seminars and workshops on different topics to enhance their knowledge. .
- Logical and rational thinking among students is developed through their participation in debates, declamation and other creative activities at College, inter College and University levels.
- Various books, magazines and journals available in the College library help in enhancing logical and critical thinking among the students.
- The annual literary magazine `ARAMBH' published by Punjabi Department of the College provides opportunity to the students to express their thoughts and creativity in the form of articles, stories and other literary writings.

- Keeping in mind the professional growth of teachers and exposure of students, conferences, faculty development programmes and workshops are organized in the College.

Library of the College plays a vital role in augmenting the teaching-learning process.

- College library is well equipped with 47000 books, 17 Journals of various subjects and 18 general magazines.
- In the beginning of each academic session, the librarian holds orientation programmes for the students and acquaints them with library rules as well as library facilities.
- The library staff extends a helping hand to all the students in searching library resources especially to visually/physically challenged students by getting them books issued on priority basis.
- Departmental Library of College also facilitates the teaching learning process through provision of Book Bank facility to the needy students.
- Departmental Library of Economics has also become functional in the current session with the help of books donated by faculty and Alumni of the department for reference of the students.
- Users' feedback is also collected through the suggestion box and through personal interaction with the students from time to time. While most of the suggestions are handled at the departmental level, major matters like library infrastructural enhancement and procurement of knowledge resources is done through meetings of the library committee with the Principal.

- Faculty members are also facilitated to attend faculty development programmes and workshops conducted by other Institutions.
- For improved teaching learning, our faculty members put strenuous efforts to handle new curriculum, teachers take help of newly introduced text books, reference books as well as the material available on internet. Books from the University library are also consulted.
- A major portion of the prescribed syllabi is covered with the help of text books and reference books recommended by GNDU (Affiliating University) In case of nonavailability of material or equipments, special lectures of eminent speakers are organized by departments..
- Visits of science students to Laboratories of other Institutions are organized for their practical knowledge.
- Field visits are also planned which widens the domain of learner's knowledge and understanding.

### **Cross Cutting Issues**

The efforts made by the College to integrate the cross cutting issues into the curriculum are as follows:

• Environmental Education has become an integral part of the syllabus for under graduate classes in which the students are acquainted with comprehensive knowledge about how to save their environment.

- Science and Environment Society, Green Glade Group and NSS unit of the College work constantly towards tree plantations in the College
- NSS units Cross Society are committed towards the goals of community servicing and awareness concerning drugs, HIV /AIDS, Female Foeticide etc.
- College also has a **Grievance and Redressal Cell** which monitors the problems of the students. They are encouraged to discuss their problems with their teachers in tutorial classes or by putting their complaints in grievance box outside the common room.
- To meet the challenges of computer age, multi-media projectors are installed in a number of classrooms and the conceptual and the theoretical parts of the curriculum are made clear through the use of audio-visual technique.

### Strategies by the Institution in enhancing the teacher quality:

- The College organizes workshops/seminars/conferences for enhancing the teachers 'quality.
- The College facilitates the participation of faculty members in national and international conferences and seminars
- The College has provided formal training to the teachers regarding use of multimedia projectors, computers and other teaching aids.
- Eminent speakers from reputed Colleges and universities are invited to deliberate on specific topics.

# 2.4.4 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (e.g. providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national Institutions and specialized programmes industrial engagement etc.)

The Institution is committed towards extending all possible help as per UGC guidelines and Punjab Govt. rules and regulations for any research project undertaken by the faculty.

To recharge the teachers, our Institution organizes various seminars, workshops and lectures by eminent scholars from different academic bodies, Colleges and universities. The result in evident from the following table

### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

# 2.5.1 How does the Institution ensure that the stakeholders of the Institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation process?

To ensure that the stakeholders of the Institution are aware of the evaluation process, Institution takes the following steps:

- Information about the evaluation process is conveyed through College prospectus, notices on the notice-boards, tutorial classes and assemblies conducted especially before the commencement of house examinations.
- Subject teachers hold special discussions in their respective classes about the pattern
  of the question papers and the division of marks according to University pattern. The
  Principal holds special meetings with the staff members to discuss the examination
  schedule.
- Class tests/oral tests/ house-examination are conducted to evaluate the academic performance of students.
- Parents of the students detained from University exam are intimated about their wards' detention so that they can seek the advice of the teachers and the Principal.
- Parents of the students, securing less than the minimum required lectures, are also informed about their wards' detention.

## **2.5.2.** What are the major evaluation reforms of the University that the Institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the Institution on its own?

- Affiliating University has introduced semester system in place of annual system in all UG as well as PG level.
- The process of table-marking initiated by the University.

With the view to enhancing the economic relevance of the education being imparted by the College, the following measures have been initiated in the recent years:

- The social relevance aspect of the education being imparted in the College is initiated through the community oriented programmes such as NSS, NCC, Red Cross etc. to orient the students for playing an active role in reaching out to the society at large and contribute their bit to social upliftment.
- All the programmes offered in this Institution equip the students to undertake quality jobs and materialize their career ambitions. The Career Guidance and

Placement Cell is functioning in the campus to enhance the career opportunity and skills of the students. This Cell organizes lectures/workshops on Career Guidance and Job opportunities for students of various academic streams.

## 2.6.5 How does the Institution collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Performance of the students in Mid-semester exams/House exams, their classroom attendance and their involvement in various activities such as group discussions, presentations and classroom seminars provide the relevant data about the performance of the students. Based on the analysis of this data, academically weak students are identified and they are given extra attention in the form of Special Tests and Remedial Classes. Generally, the barriers are inadequate communication skills, socially, economically and educationally impoverished backgrounds. These barriers are sought to be removed by encouraging the weak students to have an exposure in the classroom teaching, by providing easily comprehensible reading material. They are given home assignments also.

#### 3.5 Consultancy

## **3.5.1** Give details of the systems and strategies for establishing institute-industry interface?

Institute industry interface is facilitated for the Commerce students through visits to banks and insurance companies for their project reports as per the curriculum. This provides an exposure to the students in financial sector. Students from Science department visit Pushpa Gujral Science City, Horticulture department and Practical Labs of other institutes for the purpose of interaction and employability.

Students from Home Science department get practical training for stitching, tie & dye, block-printing, flower arrangement, rangoli etc. these students are 'Earning while learning and enhance gaining experience to be established as professionals in their field. Arrangements were made for the visit of students to the 'Hand Operated Looms' at Mansoorwal Dona, District Kapurthala.

Students from the Botany department visited Jagatjit Distillery, Hamira, in District Kapurthala. Their visit to Mushroom Cultivation and Vermi Compost Ventures were also initiated.

### **3.5.2** What is the stated policy of the Institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized?

The Institution is privileged to have competent faculty to provide consultancy services, but being Govt. Institution we can't engage ourselves in independent formal consultancy services. However, faculty members provide counselling to the students at the time of admissions and in the class-rooms. The Career Counselling and Guidance Cell provides platform to the students to interact with experts from outside as well as our own faculty also.

### **3.5.3** How does the Institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?

The faculty members are encouraged to utilize their expertise for consultancy in the following manner:

- Faculty members are appointed by University as paper setters.
- Faculty members are appointed by Punjab Government as subject experts for evaluation of answer books of PCS examination.
- Members of the faculty frequently visit other Institutions as Resource Persons in their areas of specialization.
- Members of faculty are also appointed as subject experts by Higher Education Department for selection of suitable candidates in other Institutions of higher education.
- Good number of faculty members act as judges for various competitions at College and University levels.
- College Principal Mrs. Meena Malhotra is deputed as member, Sports Committee

(W) of GNDU, Amritsar.

- Faculty members from Physical Education Department of the College act as member of Sports Selection Committee of GNDU, Amritsar.
- Faculty members are invited to participate in Panel Discussion and Talks in All India Radio and Jalandhar Doordarshan.

Faculty members are also members and honorary office bearers of various clubs, societies and associations at local, national and international level.

- Financing co- curricular, cultural and welfare activities of students

#### 3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional social Responsibility (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the Institution promote Institution-neighbourhood community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

Students engaged in Institution-Community network is an important aspect of the Institution. The students are encouraged and motivated to participate in community service activities like NSS(Girls and Boys wing), NCC(Girls & Boys unit), Red Ribbon Club, Participation in District Level Literacy Drive, Red Cross and Youth Club

- One day and seven days' Camps are organized by NSS Units of the College. During these camps lectures are delivered on important issues like health and hygiene, cleanliness, traffic rules, rights of women etc. NSS units undertake activities that create social awareness and generate a sense of responsibility among the students. The volunteers adopt nearby village and work tirelessly for the betterment and upliftment of its people. Drug de-addiction initiatives are also taken by NSS wing.
- NCC cadets attend camps organized by their respective Directorates. They also undertake training which makes them disciplined and self-reliant.
- NSS Units & Red Cross Unit, in collaboration with the Civil Hospital and District Red Cross Society, organizes Blood Donation Camps. Various seminars on social evils are also organized.
- The collective **participation** of the student and faculty members is reflected in activities like tree plantation, water conservation and other environment sustenance programmes.

- **District Legal Literary Drive** carried out by the Institution for awareness and knowledge about rights and responsibilities among the students, particularly regarding rights of women.
- Red Cross Society with the help of Red Ribbon Club organizes AIDS awareness camps for the students.
- After the College hours, the young sports enthusiasts from the community engage themselves in outdoor sports activities like Basketball and Cricket etc. on the College grounds.
- In addition to the above, the College as an effort to promote social responsibility has formed the following Committees, which are functional to redress the grievances, are given below:
- Mahila Shikayat Niwaran Committee
- Anti-Ragging Committee
- Grievance and Redressal Cell

#### Visits and Excursions

Different departments like Commerce, History, Philosophy, Home Science, Economics and Science departments undertake **educational visits and activities** that promote holistic development of students. The following is a list of excursions:

- NSS organized visit to Chhat Bir, Chandigarh., Visit to Seechewal village, where Baba Balbir Singh ji Seechewal (eco-activist) has taken initiative to spearhead an anti–pollution campaign, Visit to Harike WetLand which is also known as Hari-ke-Pattan.
- Department of Philosophy and Economics organized separate visits to Pushpa Gujral Science City, Kapurthala, Wonderland and Rangla Punjab, Jalandhar.

### **3.6.2** What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements/activities which promote citizenship roles?

Our Institution is committed to make our students aware of their social responsibilities and continuous efforts are made to groom them to become responsible citizens. The students are enrolled as volunteers for two NSS units in the College to carry out community servicing programme. Students are also enrolled as cadets for two wings of NCC. Faculty members as

NSS Programme Officers and NCC Officers supervise the involvement of students who undertake activities like training, attending camps, social service and Institution community interaction. Student involvement in these activities is highlighted in Annual Report, College Prospectus and Newspapers.

The College regularly solicits feedback from its stakeholders to improve quality of education and standard of services. The College provides different platforms to seek feedback of its various stakeholders.

\* Students are free to approach the Principal during working hours without prior appointment to convey their grievance/feedback.

\*The College administration holds separate meetings with meritorious and academically weak students during the academic session to improve learning outcomes of the students..

Parents:

- The Parents of any student are free to meet the teachers and the Principal on all working days to convey their suggestions or complaints.
- The Parents are also members of PTA, an Executive Body of the College.
- The feedback and opinion of parents is taken into consideration while chalking out programs such as infrastructural development of the College, student support initiatives and co-curricular activities in the College.

3.6.4 How does the Institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall developments of students.

The Institution plans and organizes the extension and outreach programmes to sensitize the students towards societal needs and their social responsibilities with the help of NSS units, NCC wings, Red Cross Society, Youth Club and subject societies. Some of the extension activities undertaken in the previous years are mentioned below:

#### 1. Activities of NSS:

NSS units of the College work throughout the year and carryout extension and outreach programmes with the zeal of social service. The NSS volunteers extend their services in collaboration with Civil Hospital, Kapurthala for carrying out various programmes like Aids Awareness, Pulse Polio Drive and Blood Donation etc. These volunteers also work for the upliftment of neighboring villages.

- NSS volunteers participated in Seven (Ten days) days camps and five (One day) camps on annual basis.
- Special lectures were organized for NSS volunteers regarding Road Safety Rules, Fire Safety, Environment Preservation and HIV/ AIDS Awareness.
- NSS Wings celebrates Van Mahatosav by planting trees in the campus and outside at various places in Kapurthala.
- NSS Wings organized consumer awareness camp at Sidhwan Dona in 2010-2011.
- NSS Volunteers visited Old Age Home at Jalandhar during 2010-2011.
- Volunteers visited Home for Mentally Challenged Children and Dr. BR Ambedkar Bhawan for cleanliness drive.
- Two days workshops, in collaboration with Civil Hospital Kapurthala on Awareness and Prevention Against Drug Addiction, were organized for NSS volunteers.
- Special lectures on Agricultural subsidiary occupation like Poultry farming and Bee keeping were organized for the students.
- Tours and excursions of NSS volunteers to Virast-E-Khalsa Anandpur Sahib, Chhat Bir, Harike Pattan Wetland, Seechewal village during the last few years.
- Blood Donation Camps are organized on annual basis.
- Anti Tabacco Day is also observed on annual basis.

#### 2. Activities of NCC:

- NCC Cadets attended Training Camps, Basic Leadership Camps and Shooting Camps on annual basis.
- 20 NCC Cadets qualified for NCC 'B' and 'C' certificates
- NCC Cadet Anil s/o Sh. Jang Bahadur represented the College in NCC camp in Common Wealth Games in New Delhi for the period 27-09-2010 to 17-10-2010.

- NCC Cadet Subhash s/o Sh. Baij Nath attended National Level Infantry Camp at Delhi from 02-09-2011 to 13-09-2011.
- NCC Cadet Harleen Kaur attended Republic Day Parade Camp from 01-01-2013 to 29-01-2013.
- NCC Cadet Gurcharan Singh represented Punjab State Mavlansai Shooting Championship in 2012.
- NCC Cadet Amandeep Kaur D/o Sh. Charanjiv Lal attended National Infantry Camp at New Delhi from 27-09-2013 to 08-10-2013.
- 2 NCC Cadets represented the College in Mountaineering course camp in Kashmir from 01-08-2013 to 26-08-2013.

#### 3. Activities of Red Cross:

- Blood Donation Camps are organized on annual basis with the help of NSS units and blood bank civil hospital Kapurthala.
- Special lectures were organized with the help of Punjab State AIDS Control Society and District Chief TB Officers.
- Special lectures were organized on first AID (Dr. Aman Kapila) and HIV AIDS awareness (Dr. Arshpreet Kaur).
- Visit of Red Ribbon Van for TB and HIV/AIDS awareness among students in the campus.
- Student volunteers of Red Cross Society participate in Bhai Kanahiya Ji Divas on annual basis.
- The society also disburses financial support to the economically weak students.

4. Students of Economics and English department visited Unique Home, Jalandhar (Home for abandoned girls) and contributed to their fund. The students volunteered their services for counseling of inmates of Unique Home.

5. Number of faculty members extended financial help to students from down trodden sections of society. A number of girl students have been provided with financial help to pursue their B.Ed. and M.Ed. degrees from other Institutions of Higher Education. These efforts have resulted in women empowerment as these students are getting placements in educational Institutions.

3.6.5 How does the Institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/ International agencies?

The students are encouraged to become members of units of NSS, NCC, Red Cross Society and Youth Club. Every Year, optimum number of students are enrolled and motivated to participate in camps and other extension activities.

Participation of students and faculty members in these activities is facilitated by the Institution through provision of duty leave and travelling allowances. The faculty members help these students in case they miss their regular classes and are provided with opportunities to take special tests if they miss their house examination

The Institution is very much committed towards the cause of social justice and engages in initiatives for the betterment of under-privileged strata of society. Some of the initiatives in this regard are:

- The students of Economics department have carried out socio-economic surveys to sensitize the students towards workers performing menial jobs like domestic women workers, street vendors, rickshaw pullers etc.
- The students are sensitized about social evils like female foeticide, violence against women and other social evils affecting the social fabric with the help of Community Policing Centre, District Legal Literacy Club etc.
- Students extend their services for carrying out Pulse Polio Drive and Vote Awareness Campaign.
- NSS units organize visits to Home for Mentally Challenged Children to sensitize the volunteers towards the plight of inmates of this place.
- These faculty members extend financial assistance to students from economically deprived sections of society. They are provided with books and other necessary requisites.
- Physically challenged students are also granted concessions and provided with physical support by the students and faculty members.

# 3.6.7 Reflecting on objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the Institution, comment on how the complement students' academic learning experience and specify the values and skills inculcated.

Participation of students in extension activities complements students' academic learning experience as they are enlightened about issues and problems confronting their society and fellow beings.

- Visits of students to home for Mentally Challenged Children, Unique Home (Place for Abandoned Girl Child) and Kusht Asharm etc, help them to understand the problems and needs of inmates of these places. They develop empathy and sympathy towards abandoned and disabled people.
- While carrying out socio-economic surveys, students interact with different strata of community which enables them to improve their social skills and etiquettes.
- Student participation in social campaigns like Voter Awareness and Pulse Polio Drive help them to become aware and enlightened citizens of the country.

Thus student participation in extension activities helps in holistic development of students' personality and equips them with confidence to face challenges of life.

Community Institutions networking are promoted with the help of following activities:

- NSS volunteers adopt nearby villages for the upliftment of community.
- Career counseling and guidance cell invites experts to interact with students of the College and share their work experiences with them.
- Blood Donation Camps are organized with the help of Civil Hospital, Kapurthala and Red Cross Society.
- District Civil and Police Administration organize programmes in College Jubilee Hall to sensitize students against drug addiction, gender disparity and other issues concerning society.

This interaction of the students with police and civil administration is a very useful exercise to impart basic values which can easily be carried to community at large.

- Faculty members of the College are also members of local clubs, NGOs and societies which provide them with suitable platform to extend their services for various outreach programmes for the welfare of society.
- ✤ Faculty members also impart their services as resource persons for extension programmes of clubs and societies like Bharat Jagran March, Nehru Yuva Kendra etc.

However, the affiliating University i.e. Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar doesn't recognize the research centers in the affiliated Colleges. But a good number of teachers collaborate with the researchers of universities and Institutions of higher education at individual level which has resulted in collaborative research.

No formal MoU has been signed by the College with any other Institution or industry. But efforts are made for interactions with other institutes to provide exposure to students and faculty members. However, the Institution develops linkages with various organizations for the benefit of students and community at large.

- College partners with district administration for various programmes related to Traffic Rules Awareness, Legal Literacy, Voter Awareness, Drug de Addiction and Female Foeticides etc.
- The students and faculty members of the College actively participate in the programmes of AIDS Awareness and Polio Vaccination in collaboration with Civil Hospital, Kapurthala.
- NSS units adopt nearby villages and collaborate with panchayat for carrying out various community services.
- The Principal of our College is on the Advisory Committee of Community Police Resorce Centre, Guru Nanak District Library and District Red Cross Society, Kapurthala. The College cooperates with the administration in all its outreach programmes.
- Blood donation camps are organized in the College in collaboration with Civil Hospital, Kapurthala to save precious human lives.
- The College successfully conducted the Training Programme in Tourism Awareness for the students. This programme was conducted in collaboration with Punjab Heritage and Tourism Promotion Board and UN World Tourism Organization during Oct-Nov 2012.
- Our college hosted Zonal Youth Festival (Zone-D) of Guru Nanak Dev University. Hosting of this event provided quality exposure to students of the college towards cultural events. The College faculty exhibited their Organizational and Management skills during the conduct of this event on Oct. 2013.
- Experienced faculty members viz. Dr. Tirath Basra (Commerce), Prof. Prabhjot Singh (Physics) and Dr. Satvinder Kaur (Economics) are subject experts in Punjab Edusat Society. These faculty members along with other resource persons prepare the schedule for delivery and telecast of lectures as per the University syllabi.

In this cost free programme, IT communication and skill enhancement training was given to create a bridge between academicia and the industry.

**Edu-sat:** Education through satellite is provided free of cost to the students in collaboration with the government of Punjab.

Our Institution is making the following efforts :

- Curriculum Enrichment: Student centric teaching methods in the classrooms and consistent efforts for the conduct of practical in case of lab based courses are aimed at curriculum enrichment.
- Faculty Exchange and Professional Development: There is no formal arrangement for faculty exchange in our Institution. But faculty members are facilitated to extend their services towards other Institutions on honorary basis. Faculty members from department of Economics, Commerce and Science visit these Institutions to deliver

special lectures. At the same time, faculty members from other Institutions of higher education are invited to deliver extension lectures in our College.

- Consultancy: College Principal and faculty members visit other Institutions to extend their consultancy services. District administration also seeks consultancy services from our faculty while carrying out various programmes concerning the society at large. Faculty members work as master trainers for conduct of elections at local/state/central level. They also provide their services for carrying out programmes against social evils like violence against women, female foeticide, drug addiction etc.
- Extension: Our students are sensitized towards societal needs and hence undertake extension activities like blood donation, pulse polio drive, voter awareness and tree plantation etc. These activities are performed under the able supervision of dedicated faculty members who work tirelessly for the welfare of community at large.
- Publication: Faculty members of our College have a good number of publications to their credit. The Tribune, Punjabi Tribune and Ajit newspapers have published many research articles of Prof. B.S. Virk of Commerce Department. Research papers of faculty members of Economics, Punjabi, History, Commerce and Science have been published in Journals of other Institutions at regional and national level.

#### Placement

- Post graduate students of our College have got placement as assistant professors in English, Commerce and Economics in various Institutions of Higher Education.
- Students of Computer Science, Commerce and Economics get placements in Banking and Financial Institutions.
- Our students also qualify various competitive examinations for placements in Police Force, Armed Forces and Civil Administration.

#### Introduction of new courses:

We plan to introduce new courses like Diploma in Accountancy, PG in Punjabi and Music.

- **Hotline-** The College has a hotline connection which ensures 24X7 power supply to the Institution.
- **Generator** Apart from the hotline, College has a generator for administrative block, U-Block and Jubilee Hall to ensure power supply in case of emergency.
- Constant supply of water The College has its own water tank (50,000 ltrs.) in the campus itself. Moreover, there are three water coolers with RO system installed at different places in the College premises. Two employees have been hired for constant vigil of electricity supply.
- Expenditure of maintenance and upkeep of sensitive equipment is done out of PTA fund and HEIS fund.

- 3. **Cooking Classes:** The students of Home science department are trained during their final year to start their cooking classes as they study about nutritive value of different foods, food groups, different methods of cooking, preservation and the recipes related to these are experimented in the laboratory during the practical.
- 4. **Crèche cum Pre-School:** Home-Science subject enables students to start their own crèche and pre-school as they study about child psychology in details.
- 5. **Music:** Music students are performing at stage shows and their tracks /CD have been released as they are becoming professionals.

For the holistic development of the students teaching is supplemented with active participation in extra curricular and co-curricular activities. At the outset of the academic session, Talent search contests are organized for fresher, to identify the students who excel in various cultural activities. These students are encouraged to participate in the College/ inter College activities and the youth festival.

To promote participation the Institution provides:

- (a) Additional academic support in terms of academic counseling outside classrooms, special house examination and duty leave.
- (b) Refreshment for students participating in various activities.
- (c) Costumes for participants in cultural activities.
- (d) Instructors for theatre items, folk dances and orchestras.
- (e) Free transportation

The grievances redressed cell of our Institution is monitored by the Principal and a committee which includes senior members of the faculty. The students are encouraged to discuss their problems with their especially during the tutorial meets. After discussion

with the Principal a speedy redressed is ensured. The nature of grievances brought to the notice of the committee during the last five years were:

- 1. Regarding drinking water
- 2. Electricity fans, lights etc.
- 3. Infra-Structure
- 4. Discipline problems
- 5. Mutual conflicts of students

Problems related to water, electricity and infra-structure were instantly taken care of by the Principal and the concerned committee. Problems related to indiscipline are redressed by Discipline Committee and disciplinary actions are taken against the defaulters. To ensure that there is perfect discipline; teachers are deputed on proctorial duty. In case of grave problems, the parents of erring students are informed and the student is suspended for a week.

### 5.1.11 What are the Institutional provisions for issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

The College has a **Mahila Shikayat Nivaran Committee** for women employees and students. It is constituted of the senior and experienced lady teachers. The Committee is formed for prevention, prohibition and redressal of harassment of women at work place. The committee redresses the complaints of girl students, teachers and administrative staff.

Anti ragging cell of the College is an active body that keeps a constant vigil to ensure that there is no incident of ragging in the College. It is constituted of five senior teachers. Statutory warning namely '**Ragging is a punishable offence and is strictly prohibited**' are displayed at 03 strategic locations in the College. Every year at the beginning of the session, the students are apprised of the negative aspects of ragging in the assemblies and the tutorial sessions. The staff members and the College Council play a positive and constructive role in curbing this menace and till date there has been no instance of ragging in the College.

The Principal is overall In-charge of all policy matters. He/she executes plans by forming different committees

Various methods are used for planning through some department researches, e.g. Computer Science Department, Home Science Department, and Commerce Department help in forming various plans. College IQAC plans for improvement in quality education.

The Principal, in association with College IQAC, College Council formulates plans for culture of excellence. Every department suggests its strengths and weaknesses, so that a Institutional excellence may be achieved

#### • Champion organizational change

The College has sophisticated infrastructure with modern labs and smart classrooms to meet latest education techniques. Job Oriented courses like PGDCA, B.Sc. 
## 6.2.2 Does the Institute has a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

#### **Community engagement**

To make our students sensitive towards the cultural, economic and environmental realities society, the College has two units of NSS, two wings of NCC, Red Cross Society, Legal Literacy Club, Environment Club and many other units involved in interaction with various components of the community. Guest lectures are organized to create awareness among students and to help them imbibe civic responsibility.

#### Human resource management

The College is sensitive to the significant role of human resource management for its smooth and effective operation. The vacancy in the staff is managed by recruitment of guest faculty. Besides teaching, other duties are assigned to each and every teacher with full accountability and responsibility. The annual duties are rotated periodically to maintain the comfort level of teaching and non-teaching faculty. The faculty members are encouraged to enrich their competence through various faculty development programs, like seminars, conferences, symposia, workshops etc.

#### Industry interaction

The students are provided a platform for interaction with officials from banks, industries and other public sector organizations. Special talks and interactive sessions are organized by different departments.

## 6.2.5 How does the Head of the Institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the Institution?

College solicits the stakeholders' perception on overall performance and quality of education being imparted by our Institution. - Annual report of the College providing detailed information regarding the academic and administrative activities is sent to from Director Public Instructions (Colleges), Punjab and Department of Higher Education.
- The implementation of policies and their outcomes is made available for other stakeholders through notices, assemblies, annual PTA Meetings, Alumni Meet, College prospectus and other electronic media like College website.

## 6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support the involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the Institutional processes?

- College follows a system of participative management. Academic and administrative policies are designed and implemented under the enlightened leadership of the Principal. Faculty members contribute equally at all levels to ensure smooth functioning of the institute.
- Head of the Departments and Coordinators enjoy autonomy in terms of syllabus distribution, organizing field visits, tours and arranging seminars, guest lectures, awareness programmes.
- The needs, problems and suggestions for educational and infrastructural reforms are discussed in staff meetings with other faculty members.

College being a Government Institution does not have Managing Council. It is managed by Govt. of Punjab through from Director Public Instructions (Colleges), Punjab. However for smooth functioning of the Institution, College Council is functional which comprises five senior most faculty members. The Council works under the chairmanship of the College Principal.

# 6.2.8 Does the affiliating University make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated Institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the Institution in obtaining autonomy?

No, our affiliating University has no provision for according autonomous status to its affiliated Institutions. But, since ours is a Government College, every decision regarding the above stated is routed through the office of the Director Public Instructions (Colleges), Punjab and Higher Education Department, Punjab.

# 6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

- The College has a systematic mechanism to address the grievances of the faculty members and the staff.
- A Grievance Redressal Committee "Mahila Shikayat Nirwan Committee "has been operational in this College. It comprises senior faculty members:
  - Mrs. Gurcharan Kaur Batra Associate Prof. (Economics)
  - Mrs. Jatinder Kaur Dhir Associate Prof. (Home Science)

- Mrs. Manjit Kaur Associate Prof. (Botany)
- Mrs. Harwinder Kaur Associate Prof. (English)
- Dr. Satwinder Kaur Associate Prof. (Economics)
- Mr. Varinder Kumar Associate. Prof. (Commerce)
- The personal grievances of the students are dealt with in the tutorial classes where a teacher is allotted a fixed number of students (app. 50) to facilitate interaction and subsequent redressal of grievances.
- The College has an Anti-ragging committee to control the menace of ragging and to provide free environment to the students.
- Annual General Body Meetings of PTA serves as a platform for parents to share their grievances with the teachers which are recorded for review purposes.
- The Principal amicably settles the grievances of the teaching and non-teaching staff on the basis of one to one interaction.

## 6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the court on these?

Being a State managed public body, court cases are filed against the policies of State Govt.

- 1. Mr. Baldev Singh: Mr. Baldev, beldar, worked in the year 2007-08 and consequently because of continuous service (service of more than 240 days), he claimed employment with back wages. As he failed to prove that he worked for more than 240 days, his case was dismissed and decided in favour of College during August 2015.
- 2. Mrs. Chiranjiv Kaur: Mrs. Chiranjiv, retired Associate professor in English, was not paid her retirement benefits within time and consequently she filed suit. She was awarded 9% interest for late payment of her dues. (Her case of execution of decree is pending)
- **3. Ms. Rohini Tiwari:** In this case, Ms Rohini Tiwari student of M.Com 2<sup>nd</sup> semester filed case against Principal, VC and Mr. Basra for denying her to appear in examination during the month of May,2012. Ultimately, she withdrew the case in the month of August,2013.
- **4. Mr. Paramjit Kumar's case:** Mr. Paramjit, retired SLA/JLA, approached Hon'ble High Court asking DPI and secretary to grant proficiency step up which he is entitled to on

completion of 24 years' service, which became due to him on 1.10.2004. As per CWP no.23163 dated 23.11.2012, there is order to secretary and DPI to decide his case within 2 months.

**5. Mr. Ashwani Sayal:** There are bundle of cases that have been disposed off/ dismissed in the Hon'ble Punjab and Haryana High Court:

CWP-13195 of 2005 Disposed off CWP 1264-2006 Dismissed CWP 9805-2010 Disposed off CWP 17139 2012 Dismissed

There was concept of Court Case for non-payment of his suspension allowance w.e.f. Oct, 2010 to March, 2012 and non-decision regarding his senior and selection grade. As he was paid the allowances and DPI Colleges passed the order of not granting grades to him because he failed to secure adequate points for promotion, the case was disposed off.

#### Pending Cases

- 1. **Mr. Relu Ram:** Mr. Relu Ram is claiming more than 27 lakhs the amount of wages with 18% Interest w.e.f. Dec, 1987 when Mr. Sucha Singh was appointed. This case is concerned with execution of the decree passed in the year 1997. It was first dismissed as partly satisfied in 2008, but he again challenged in 2009. Presently the court has attached the property of the College.
- Mr. Ashwani Sayal: CWP 21801-2013 is pending before Punjab and Haryana High Court.

Mr. Sayal is suspended Lecturer in English. The case is related with granting of selection and senior grade because of pending charge sheets and enquires. He also challenges the order of Secretary and DPI regarding the manner of issuing of charge sheet and holding enquiry proceedings. Here department and higher authorities are pleading the case and we have to respond accordingly.

3. Mrs. Chiranjiv Kaur (Execution of decree): The execution of decree of the Civil Courts Kapurthla is pending.

### 6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on Institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the Institution to such effort?

Our Institution, believing in democratic approach, focuses on Institutional betterment by way of an informal student feedback mechanism.

- The feedback of the students is invited through tutorials. It has helped in providing latest infrastructure and improving teaching-learning strategies.
- Installation of water coolers at different points, RO system, Generator, renovation of washrooms and labs, and flexibility in allotments of sections, for instance are some of the reforms based on the informal student feedback.

#### 6.3 Faculty Empowerment strategies

## 6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the Institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

The College authorities encourage teaching and non-teaching staff members for their professional growth. They are encouraged and extended full assistance to update themselves in tune with contemporary international scenario.

- Staff members are immediately informed through circular on receipt of information regarding seminars/conferences/refresher/ orientation courses etc. being organised by other universities and Colleges.
- Duty leave is extended to faculty members to attend such seminars/conferences/refresher/ orientation courses.
- The staff members are encouraged to improve the research aptitude by motivating them to avail the schemes of UGC and Director Public Instructions (Colleges), Punjab for their professional development.

- With a view to review and motivate employees regarding performance of their respective roles and responsibilities, the College Principal takes staff meetings occasionally.
- The teaching faculty was trained to make the optimum use of smart boards through the special training sessions organized by the Globus Computers Ltd.
- Administrative staff is encouraged to be more computer friendly and imparted full support to introduce computers in performance of their official duties.
- Non-teaching faculty was trained in the operation of the computers for Salary bills, Receipts and Payments under various fund accounts.

## 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

- The performance appraisal system to evaluate the various activities of the staff in this College is strictly based on the guidelines issued by from Director Public Instructions (Colleges), Punjab.
- For performance evaluation, every faculty member is required to fill 'self-assessment form' which comprises information regarding their academic, administrative, professional and co-curricular accomplishments.

- This 'self-assessment report' which is part of Annual confidential Report (ACR) is further evaluated and graded by the Principal and sent to the office of the Director Public Instructions (Colleges), Punjab for necessary consideration and approval.
- For promotion of Assistant Professor/Associate Professor/Professor to their next grade, Govt. of Punjab has introduced UGC/University approved API guidelines and the College follows the instructions/directions of the government.

## 6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

- The Performance Appraisal /Self- Appraisal/Annual Confidential Reports of the faculty members duly graded and forwarded by the Principal are evaluated by the Director Public Instructions (Colleges), Punjab.
- In case Directorate finds that performance of any faculty member is unsatisfactory, it is intimated to the concerned member through the Principal with necessary instructions for improvement.
- The Performance Appraisal /Self- Appraisal/Annual Confidential Reports of nonteaching staff are also evaluated by the Director Public Instructions (Schools) Punjab.

## 6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

- This, being an Institution administered by Government of Punjab through Director Public Instructions (Colleges) Punjab. The Institution has no power to recruit new regular faculty.
- Regular Faculty is appointed by Government of Punjab through Punjab Public Service Commission (PPSC).
- All faculty members are subject to be transferred/ retained in particular College as per the orders of Punjab Government.
- Guest faculty teachers are recruited by the College, against the sanctioned vacant post in the College, as per the needs of the departments on the basis of merit and reservation policy of State Government. Those teachers who perform well are preferred to other applicants for next session.

#### 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

## 6.4.1 What is the Institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

In this College, the Institutional mechanisms to monitor effective and efficient use of available resources are strictly governed by Punjab Financial Rules/Education Code and guidelines issued by from Director Public Instructions (Colleges), Punjab. The College has a formal mechanism to monitor the financial resources. The College budget is utilized for administrative and academic activities.

#### (A) Government Budget:

- Under this head, College gets Govt. Budget allocation for payment of salaries of regular Faculty and Administrative staff.
- College Superintendent prepares total salary budget of the staff (teaching & non-teaching) on yearly basis and get it duly sanctioned from the government.
- Monthly salary bill of the regular staff is prepared and bill is submitted to the treasury office through E-Sarkar system, Government of Punjab.
- After thorough scrutiny of the salary bills, it is passed and the respective salary amount of each staff member is credited to their bank account.

#### (B) Amalgamated / Student Funds

• All type of purchases out of Amalgamated Fund/ Student Funds are made as per following rules of Punjab Government:

- The Conveners seek formal sanction of the Principal on the prescribed form for spending a specified sum of money in order to execute the work assigned to the committee.
- The state government rules regarding calling of quotations from the market, floating tenders or purchasing equipment etc. on the State Government approved/DGS&D approved rates are followed strictly in letter and spirit.
- All purchases / expenditure above Rs. 500/- per item, are made mandatorily through Quotations.
- For an expenditure up-to Rs. 50,000/- per item out of Amalgamated Fund/ Student Funds, the sanction is granted through the channel of officials like Fund clerk, College Bursar and Principal.
- If cost of purchase/expenditure on one item is more than Rs.50, 000/- then official authorisation is sought from Director Public Instructions (Colleges), Punjab
- If cost of one item is more than Rs. 2,00,000/- then official authorization is sought from Secretary Higher Education Govt. of Punjab.

(C) For PTA (Parent Teacher Association)/HEIS (Higher Education Institute Society) funds:

- PTA and HEIS Funds are governed as per Punjab Government Rules and PTA/HEIS Constitution.
- All Purchases/ Expenditure the first instance are passed in the in the Executive Committee meeting of PTA/ HEIS.
- Principal forms Committees for various types of purchases or expenditure and the senior most member is appointed as convener or in-charge of the committee.
- The convener seeks formal sanction of the Principal on the prescribed form for spending a specified sum of money in order to execute the work assigned to the committee.
- For expenditure out of PTA/HEIS Funds the sanction is granted through the channel of officials like Fund clerk, PTA and Finance Secretary of HEIS and Principal.

#### (D) For UGC Funds:

- UGC funds are monitored and regulated by the Principal and UGC in-charge in the College.
- All spending are made as per guidelines issued by UGC for funds under specific grant/ head of expenditure.
- UGC Committee regulates the budget allocation for different purposes under the guidance of the Principal.
- The Purchase Committee Convener looks after the purchase/expenditure. A Sanction form duly filled in by the Convener for any expenditure stating the purpose and estimate based on market survey.
- It is scrutinized by the UGC in-charge of the College and later approved by the College Principal for further action.
- Records are duly maintained by the UGC clerk with invoices for further compliance.

The College Fund Clerk, PTA clerk, HEIS clerk, UGC clerk, cashier, superintendent, Bursar of College, cashier of PTA and finance secretary of HEIS and UGC in-charge monitor the entire Institutional mechanisms and help the College Principal to monitor effective and efficient use of available resources.

#### (E) For RUSA (Rashtriya Uchhatar Shiksha Abhiyan ) Funds:

- Utilisation of funds received under these schemes is governed by guidelines issued by Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Govt. of India.
- All spending are made as per specific component under this scheme.

IQAC is aimed to develop a sustainable and consistent plan of action focused to improve the academic and administrative performance of the Institution. It emphasizes on:

- To prepare road map on action for the academic sessions and to ensure their efficiency implementation.
- To earmark strength and weaknesses in the quality assurance procedures to evaluate the teaching and learning outcomes.
- To establish and maintain quality benchmarks.
- To expedite a feedback mechanism for further mechanism for further reformation and development.

 Proposals and plans earmarked by the College IQAC are endorsed by the authorities in consonance with the IQAC for successful implementation. College IQAC is committed to the goal of quality education which is also mentioned in its vision statement which reads as below.

Their valuable advice helps in matters related to administration and chalking out various activities concerning growth of the Institution and its stakeholders.

- IQAC fosters a constructive relationship with the College Alumni as well as existing students. Based upon the inputs from the feedback and suggestions by them makes ground to formulate agenda for the ensuing meeting of IQAC.
- Alumni enrich the students with their experiences through guest lectures and valuable suggestions on course which is marked as a token of gratitude to their alma mater.
- Alumni of the College has been harbinger of numerous welfare activities related to welfare by organizing Blood Donation Camp, Pulse Polio Campaign, Financial Aid to economically weak students and up keeping of College infrastructure by maintenance of OSA Park, Science Park and College Main Gate.

## (e) How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the Institution?

 IQAC comprises a heterogeneous mix of intellects from different streams viz. Sciences, Arts, Humanities and Languages. All these create a vivid skill set and they share the elements of decisions of IQAC with other constituents of the College for valuable feedback followed by effective implementation.

• Institution has adopted a dual approach on both Academic and Administrative fronts for quality assurance activities with its operationalization.

#### Academic reforms:

- Maintenance of Attendance registers for the students to keep a track on student's progress.
- Conducting periodic staff meets and recording the minutes helpful to make teaching interesting and learning more effective and efficient.

- Emanation of the internal audit mechanism headed by the Principal and assisted by nominated senior counsels is introduced. It is aimed to ensure disciplined and punctual attendance of the students in their respective classes.
- Conducting student centric programs viz. guest lectures, seminars and workshop are prominent part of the curriculum, hence enriching the confidence and knowledge of the students. Besides, its initiation of remedial classes to enable the weak students as an effective academic tool for their academic upgradation is a valuable source of interaction and awareness.

#### Administrative reforms:

- Initiation of a review committee chaired by the Principal meant to review the activities performed on monthly basis.
- Assignment of duties to different walks of College functioning fulcrum namely Discipline, College Infrastructure, Assets maintenance, IT services etc.
- Collection of exam and semester fees and form in time bound phased manner as per the procedure and ordinance established by the University.

#### Outcome:

- Effective learning and teaching process and classroom.
- Enhanced response from students and decline in absenteeism.
- Participation and compliance by the students in College activities and directives for their individual uplift apart from professional and personal grooming.

### 6.5.3 Does the Institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the quality assurance procedures? If 'yes' give details enumerating its impact?

- On provision of training to the teaching as well as non-teaching staff to equip them with the skills required to attain the objectives and parameters set by IQAC.

- Apart from this, an external audit is done by the office of Director Public Instructions (Colleges), Punjab, Affiliating University (GNDU) from time to time.
- College audits its Academic performance through class tests, house tests and University tests.
- Remedial classes are arranged for academically weak students.
- IQAC and College Staff Council analyses the result and needful steps are initiated to improvement.

 Director Public Instructions (Colleges), Punjab and GNDU constitute the external regulatory authorities of the Colleges. All mechanism related to quality assurance in vogue in College are in line with the norms, stipulations and the requirements established by them.

- College IQAC and the College council review the teaching and learning process under the chairmanship of the Principal.
- The HoDs are nominated and delegated the task on syllabus, timetable, designing question papers, marking attendance and mark sheet within stipulated time.
- Submission of student's attendance to the office for further action to prepare lecture shortage.
- Provision of counselling for the slow learners and special remedial classes for academic/financially weak students.

### 6.5.7 How does the Institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcome to the various internal and external stakeholders?

- The Institution maintains a close coordination with its stakeholders, both external and internal through PTA meets, Alumni Meet, Prospectus, Annual reports, Magazine and other electronics media.
- Staff and students are communicated through meetings, assemblies, tutorials and orientation courses.

#### 7.1 Environmental Consciousness

#### 7.1.1 Does the institute conduct a green audit of its campus and facilities?

Our Institution has an internal green audit mechanism which ensures that the carbon foot-print on the campus does not exceed beyond permissible limits, thus contributing towards maintaining a fine ecological balance. For the maintenance and sustenance of our sprawling green campus, we devise strategies and innovative solutions to various practices like burning of wastes, seepage of water, deforestation which can prove hazardous for the environment. To achieve the above mentioned. The measures undertaken are:

- Maintaining a green cover consisting of trees, well-kept lawns including one aesthetically designed Botanical garden.
- Tree plantation on an annual basis
- Segregation of the biodegradable from non-biodegradable waste.
- Dumping of the garden waste in pits for natural decomposition which yields green manure.
- Use of chemical fertilizers and pesticides is forbidden.

#### Steps initiated by the Green Audit Team are as follows:

#### **Maintaining Biodiversity**

- The campus takes Pride in the rich assemble edge of trees including the Peepal and the Banyan which are around 200 years old. During annual Van Mahotsava Celebrations, new saplings are planted and students are made their caretakers.
- The Botanical garden of the Institution has a Unique Collection of Plants from diverse groups like Pteriodophytes, Gymnosperms, Angiosperms, Xerophytes, Cycas, Pine, Italian Cypress, Amla
- For environmental protection, organic manure and vermicompost is used to enrich the soil in gardens and flower beds.
- Use of Pesticides and chemical fertilizers is strictly forbidden.

#### WATER CONSERVATION

Effective measures undertaken in the direction are:

• Overflowing of water tanks is prevented by proper care and maintenance

• Faculty In-charge gets promptly replace the leaking and faulty taps with new ones to prevent water wastage.

#### Waste Management

Following steps have been taken reduce as well as to recycle and reuse the waste on the campus.

- Vermicompost unit has been installed to recycle the Green waste (vegetable, fruit peels) into organic manure. This manure is then used to enrich the soil in the gardens and flower beds.
- The waste is segregated. Two large compost pits have been dug and gardeners as well as sweepers are instructed to dump green/biodegradable waste in pits for natural decay and decomposition. The non bio-degradable waste is collected by the municipal corporation garbage collector.
- To ensure clean, healthy and eco-friendly environment, use of polythene bags is strictly forbidden both in the canteen. In tutorials too, the students are sensitized about the same.

#### **Energy Conservation**

Adequate steps have been taken to reduce the wastage of electricity in the campus. The incandescent bulbs have been replaced by the energy saving compact fluorescent lamps (CFL's).

#### 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the College to make the campus eco-friendly?

The initiatives taken in this direction are:

• The students are continuously sensitized towards healthy green environment in tutorial meetings. The members of the staff take special onus on themselves to keep the campus eco-friendly.

#### Energy Conservation

The staff and students ensure that the lights and fans are switched off while leaving the classrooms or laboratories, as it is the first and most important step towards energy conservation.

- Use of incandescent bulbs has been discontinued strictly; CFL's and tubes are installed in all the classrooms, offices and laboratories.
- The wattage of lamps/tubes installed is as per the light requirement of the room.
- In labs, the electric appliances and electronic gadgets are disconnected immediately after use.

 In summers the temperature settings of Air Conditioners is maintained at 24°C, as a power saving step

#### Water Harvesting

#### **Efforts for Carbon Neutrality**

As already stated, the Internal Green Audit Team ensures that the carbon footprint on the campus does not exceed beyond the permissible limits. Various strategies and innovative solutions are evolved and implemented to achieve the desired results.

- The garden waste like fallen leaves, twigs and grass shavings are not burnt but dumped into huge pits for natural decay which subsequently yields manure.
- The campus has around 300 mature trees that act as a carbon sink that cleans and purifies the air.
- Van Mahotsav is celebrated and now saplings are planted and are taken care of by our young students with great love and enthusiasm.
- The sprawling green campus is the reservoir of fresh air for the immediate neighbourhood.

#### Plantations

- Our Institution is the epitome of the green revolution with standing trees, acres of lush green eco-friendly campus, well maintained lawns and green pathways. To sustain the ecological balance a plantation drive is undertaken annually during 'Van Mahotsav'.
- The Botanical Garden houses different types of trees, shrubs, herbs, etc. The scientific as well as common names are displayed for their easy recognition. Majestic Pine, Cycas, Italian Cypress, Banyan, Neem Jatropha etc. are among the botanical garden flora.
- Not only is environmental science taught as an integral part of the curriculum but our scientifically designed Botanical Garden proves beyond doubt that our teaching is translated into a healthy eco-friendly practice.

#### Hazardous Waste Management

- The young entrants of B.Sc.-I year are given an orientation lecture by the Head of the Chemistry department on the safe use of chemicals. The students are cautioned against the careless handling of dangerous chemicals.
- The teachers as well as the lab staff ensure that the students handle the chemicals carefully during the practicals. They are instructed to use the chemicals as per the requirement. Chemicals wastes are carefully disposed under the supervision of the

lab attendants and teachers after minimizing their hazardous effects. The students are forbidden to throw the chemicals in the open carelessly.

#### 7.2 Innovation

Following innovative practices have been undertaken over the past 4 years to create a positive impact on the student centric learning environment of the College:

- Automation of library has given a boost to the learning resources.
- Computerization of administrative and examination branch has ensured easy and systematic maintenance and preparation of records.
- Women Police Personnel have been deputed at the entrance of the College to ensure the security of the girls.
- Our canteen comprises of well stocked edibles and proper hygienic atmosphere is maintained.
- For orderly parking of the vehicles in the campus, a new parking area has been constructed.
- RO's have been installed to ensure clean drinking water to the students.

#### Format for Presentation of Practice

#### 1. Title of the practice:

#### **Education Inclusion**

2. Goal: Our guiding principle for Education Inclusion is based on easy access, student success and high quality learning. This design aims to integrate diversity, equity and educational quality efforts. Our Institution endeavors to develop effective educational practices that would lead to transformational change for student learning and achievement.

The focus would be to develop effective verbal, non-verbal, written, technological and media communication skills to support and enhance student learning.

Being a govt. Institution, our College primarily caters to the needs of students from socially and economically backward sections of the society. The aim of the practice is to enhance their learning capabilities so that they are better placed in the society.

- **3.** The Context: The Institution is providing admissions to students to various courses primarily on merit basis but due weightage is also given to the socio- economic backwardness. The Institution adheres to the norms of Punjab Govt. with regard to reservation to SC/BC and other categories. Institutional strategies are chosen keeping in view that the bulk fabric belongs to socio-economic backward section and to foster in their cognitive ability to transform them into socially functional unit.
- 4. The Practice: Instructional plans are crafted based on student's needs, curricular goals and subject matter. The emphasis is on continuous assessment through innovative techniques such as seminars, assignments on current topics, quiz and project work, in which maximum student participation is ensured. The Institution provides an apt platform for student's all-around development. Supporting teaching aids are used to provide quality higher education.

Best efforts are made by the Institution to provide the financial assistance under Govt. schemes on merit cum means basis. Computer based courses are also part of curriculum to provide student accessibility to upcoming dynamic areas of study. These courses are self-financed and relatively costlier for these students to afford. These courses can be made accessible for weaker sections of society if required funding is provided.

- 5. Evidence of Success: The achievement of 'Educational Inclusion' is evident from increase in proportion of students from SC/BC categories in total enrolment in the Institution. This proportion being 47.1% in 2012-13 has relatively increased to 58.7% in 2013-14. These students are also a part of merit position holders of the University and actively participate in various co- curricular activities like cultural and sports event and exhibit their valour, discipline, spirit of adventure and loyalty towards duty in NCC unit to quench their ideals of selfless service they also become a part of NSS unit, which has been actively organizing various orientation programmes in the College.
- 6. Problems: There are financial and other constraints while implementing the above mentioned goals. Some of the faculty positions as well as non-teaching posts are lying vacant. The Institution has to make arrangements out of self-generated funds. Even the carrying capacity of the Institution is limited viz a viz the no. of applicants for enrollment in various courses of study. Secondly, number of seats particularly in upcoming courses should be increased and job oriented courses must be introduced in Govt. Institutions. Vocational courses would ensure students influx and would equip them with a self-sufficient entity. Students learning for higher education would help in inclusion and would prove to be an efficient component of bringing change in society and nation at large. So there is need for expansion of Institution for higher learning.

#### 1. Title of the practice:

#### Student centric Teaching Practice

2. Goal: The main objective of the College is to provide total education i.e. an integral development of critical ability, work ethics and personality development. To assist students in adapting to new technology, concepts thus equipping them to become self- sufficient entities of society. We at our College provide quality education to the students at large prospects. Thus the ambience and life skills oriented learning prepare students for meaningful careers.

Our College aims to assist students in developing knowledge, skills and fortitudes. Our College motivates the students stock of energy towards favorable constructive activities.

3. The context: Our College encompasses a variety and diversity of students. Majority of students hail from economically and socially weaker sections. Methodology of teaching involves varieties of activities followed by feedback and evaluation. Student-teacher discussions and conductive environment paves way to a better learning process. Being weaker in achieving means, economical methods are used to enhance the imbibitions of contents by the students.

4. The practice: Teaching methods are maneuvered to fit in with the mental level of the students. The capability procedures are moulded to suit the needs of students and make learning easy and enjoyable. This also adds contours to the concepts, principles and facts. Thus teaching in such a skillful manner provides conductive and congenial ambience in classroom. It not only arouses mental ability of the students but also triggers their cognitive development of thought process. By taking remedial classes, additional sessions of discussions and problem solving sessions, students' progress is checked up. These interactive sessions lesson the gap between students and teachers that facilitates in building the confidence among students so that they can interact with the teachers for clearing doubts. Students are not only chiseled academically but are also motivated for contributing their participation in various cocurricular activities. Our institute has made tremendous progress in the personality development of students by providing co-curricular activities in various fields such as fine arts, music, folk dance and literary events etc. Remedial classes are arranged for weak students belonging to economically backward sections of society. The faculty members discuss in the classrooms about opportunities of higher education and employability in their respective areas of concern. Hard work, effort and commitment from students and experienced staff give the students best chance to achieve their goal in life.

Our institute had organized UGC sponsored workshop on 'Soft Skills and Personality development" in Jan, 2011. An UGC sponsored national seminar was organized by our Institution "Post- Reform Developments in Capital market in India" in Sept, 2012. Faculty development programme on "Value addition in Teaching and Research" was also organized in Feb, 2015. The faculty members also sensitize the students about environment preservation and community servicing.

5. Evidence of Success: Our students have shone not only academically but artistically as well. Every year our students get placed in merit list of the University. Most of the students are first divisioners. They attend their lectures well and are regular in revising them. Feedback is taken by regular tests. Students participate in co-curricular activities in Youth festivals as well as organized by other Colleges of the region. Our students helped our College to bag runners up Trophy in Youth Festival in the current year. Students also enthusiastically participate in Inter College competitions like Quiz, debate, caption-contest, power point presentations, paper reading contests etc. the students not only participated but bagged various positions also. So it can be inferred that all the faculty members help in the all-round development of students' personality.

**Problems:** Lack of funds and manpower put limit to attain growth and success. Shift from annual to semester system clashes with study and cultural events. There are financial and other constraints while implementing above mentioned goals. Some of the faculty positions as well as non-teaching posts are lying vacant.

#### **POST ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES:**

- AS a part of the Post Accreditation Initiative, College IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell) has played an important role in making teaching and learning more meaningful in terms of quality and consistency. It focuses on the need to undertake new initiatives to bring a visible change in quality of teaching and learning outcomes.
- IQAC proposes to organise seminars and extension lectures to provide scholarly exposure to students and faculty members. In November 2014, Faculty Development Programme was organised at college level, which provided opportunity to young faculty members to interact with experienced and scholarly deliberations by Prof. (Dr) Harbans Singh, Prof. (Dr.) B.S. Virk, Dr. Sukhpal Singh and Prof. Jaswant Singh. The programme was a success.
- Administrative office automation has been successfully launched. The college correspondence with the affiliating University, Director Public Instructions (colleges) and other organisations have been placed on line. Module of e Sarkar has also been adopted and implemented for speedy transactions regarding salary bills and payments, students' scholarship, office records such as cash books, tax return filing, and students' returns.
- Keeping in view the requirements of young sports enthusiasts of the college, sports infrastructure has been strengthened. New gymnasium has also been set up to facilitate fitness of the students. Separate Changing rooms for boys and girls have been constructed for their convenience and comfort.
- Career Counselling and Guidance Cell of the college has extended its activities to cater to the needs of the students. In January 2011, UGC – sponsored workshop on 'Soft Skills and Personality Development' was organised by this cell in the college which was addressed by eminent scholars and resource persons. (See Annexure 3). A number of extension lectures of experts from different organisations are also arranged from time to time for students' empowerment.
- Faculty members are continuously involved in research in their respective areas of interest and have good number of publications to their credit. They are motivated to undertake Minor /Major Research Projects. Presently, two faculty members (Dr. Tirath Ram Basra of Commerce Department and Dr. Chander Kanta of History Department) have been sanctioned two minor research projects from the U.G.C.
- To update the college library, Research Journals of Economics and Commerce have been subscribed to. Provision of Internet facility has also been made available for easy access to e-resources. Process of automation of college library has also been initiated for effective management of library assets.
- Physical capacity of the college has been increased with the construction of additional Teaching Block for PG classes of Commerce in the campus.
- Multi-media projectors have been made available to different departments to facilitate technology assisted lecture delivery and effective teaching learning. RUSA grants have been utilised judiciously to equip the classrooms with latest teaching aids. Thus smart classrooms for various subjects are being effectively employed.

- Distinctive initiatives are aimed at imparting computer literacy to staff and students. Special workshops are organised in this regard, with the help of Dream Tech Labs, Jalandhar to promote computer literacy and to motivate students of Computer Science for advanced courses in C, C++, Java, Net, Oracle and Android.
- Special Remedial classes for academically weak students and slow learners, particularly from SC/BC and economically backward sections of society, are held in the college campus with the help of UGC grants and RUSA /Equity/MMER grant components. These classes have contributed towards improving the learning outcomes of economically/ academically weaker students.
- Keeping in view the specific needs of girls students, existing common room has been furnished with new furniture (RUSA Grant) and adjoining washrooms have been renovated (out of self-generated resources). Another common room for girls has been constructed on the ground floor with the grant from Govt. of Punjab
- Departmental Library of the Commerce department is functional for the last few years. Book bank facility is also extended to commerce students. Faculty members and Alumni of this department have contributed to the collection of books in this library. Post graduate students under the supervision of faculty members perform the duties of restorer and management. Departmental Library of the Economics department is also being set up.
- Alumni Association of the college actively initiated certain projects and activities for upliftment of the college upgradation of and the welfare of the students. Since 2005, this association has undertaken construction and maintenance of Main Gate, Old Student Association (OSA) and Science Parks.

#### Future plans:

- Enhancing the physical capacity of the college viz. expansion of library building, construction of seminar room, auditorium and student centre.
- Strengthening of College Library in terms of Automation, book bank and advanced learning resources.
- Introduction of PG courses in subjects of Punjabi and Music.
- Introduction of vocational and skill based courses as per the guidelines of UGC and Govt. of Punjab.
- Setting up of Central Computer Centre.
- Establishment of new laboratories for existing UG and PG programmes.
- Modernisation of classrooms with latest apparatus and fixtures.
  - Strengthening of sports infrastructure and music labs for budding sports enthusiasts and ambitious performers in music (vocal and instrumental).

## PEER TEAM REPORT ON INSTITUTIONAL ASSESSMENT AND ACCREDITATION OF N.J.S.A. GOVERNMENT COLLEGE, KAPURTHALA (PUNJAB)

#### Section 1: Preface

N.J.S.A. Government College, Kapurthala was established in 1856, as a Sanskrit Vidyalya. This Institution was upgraded as Intermediate College in 1896 by his Excellency Maharaja Jagatjit Singh and was upgraded as Degree College in 1945. The Science classes were started in 1953. Commerce faculty was added in 1986 and B.Sc. Medical was introduced in 1991. The Postgraduate classes in the subjects of English, Economics and M.Com were introduced in the year 1968, 1978 and 2004 respectively. The college is spread over an area of 31.5 acres of land and situated in the heart of the princely town of Kapurthala. The college is a grant-in-aid Institution affiliated to Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar. It got recognition by the U.G.C. under 2(F) and 12(B) in 1967. It has 40 permanent, 04 temporary and 13 are Guest Faculty teachers with 21 administrative and 7 technical staff. Presently, the college has enrolled 1499 students, out of which 1369 in undergraduate and 130 in Postgraduate classes. The number of male and female students is 858 and 641 respectively. The Unit cost of education in the college is annual.

The mission of the college is "to provide sound theoretical and practical knowledge of science, commerce, social sciences, languages and oriental studies to empower students predominantly from rural area and socially, economically and educationally weak section of the society with the tools to achieve their all round development and inculcate social and civic responsibilities amongst students of the college".

The college offers undergraduate courses under the faculties of Arts, Science and Commerce. It also offers Postgraduate courses in 4 subjects.

N.J.S.A. College, Kapurthala (Punjab), volunteered to be assessed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore and submitted its Self Study Report in June 2004. A Peer Team constituted by the Council to visit

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the college and validate the Self Study Report. The Peer Team was consisted of Prof. C.K. Sharma, former Vice Chancellor Awdesh Pratap Singh University, Madhya Pradesh as Chairperson, Prof. Nisar Ali, Professor, Department of Economics, University of Kashmir, Srinagar (Jammu & Kashmir) as member and Prof. K.L. Miglani, Principal, Arya P.G. College, Panipat (Haryana) as member Co-ordinator.

The team visited the college on 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> September 2004 and has verified the relevant documents and interacted with various constituents of the Institution. The academic, co-curricular, extra curricular, sports and other facilities of the Institution were looked into. The Peer Team interacted at length with the Principal, Teaching and Non-teaching staff, students, alumni and parents as well.

Based on the above exercise and the inputs provided during the visit, the interaction with various groups, verification of the records, facts and data, the Team assessed the college. The commendable features and areas of concern are presented in the following report.

#### Section-2 : Criterion wise Analysis

#### **Criterion 1: Curricular Aspect**

The college provides both undergraduate and postgraduate programmes in the faculty of Arts, Science, Commerce and oriental studies. At the undergraduate level in the faculty of Arts, there are 13 departments comprising of Hindi, Punjabi, English, Political Science, Economics, History, Physical Education, Music (V), Music (1), Home Science, Geography, Philosophy and Sanskrit. The faculty of Science comprises Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Mathematics. Commerce faculty offers B.Com. The college has 4 P.G. courses in English, Economics, M.Com and Acharya. The college has also introduced one vocational course i.e. English Functional with the initial grant sanctioned by the University Grants Commission.

As the college is affiliated, it follows the syllabi framed by the Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar. Some teachers are members of the different academic bodies like Board of Studies and Faculty and have contributed in the formulations of the syllabi in the various subjects. The college cannot introduce any kind of

programme of its own unless the State Government of Punjab permits them to start and sanction the required faculty and finances. Majority of the courses are conventional.

The college organises co-curricular activities such as field visits, study tours, Declamation Contests, Debates and various competitions for the students. Introduction of more subjects with local and global trends would help the students to equip themselves to face the future better.

The students feed back mechanism/teacher performance assessment by the students needs to be strengthened in the college. The evaluation of the teachers is carried out by the Principal on the basis of the analysis of the results of the University examination.

#### Criterion II: Teaching, Learning and Evaluation.

The college has adopted satisfactory teaching, learning and evaluation system. The teaching faculty of the college is qualified. The college follows the rules of the University regarding admission, teaching and evaluation. The teachers prepare their teaching annual plan and timetable, which is communicated to the students in the beginning of the session. The college also arranges guest lectures to update students and teachers regarding recent trends in the various subjects.

Methods of teaching are conventional. It is also supplemented by field trips, educational tours, guest lectures, group discussion, seminars and by making use of Over Head Projector (OHP) and LCD. The college also arranges exhibition, debates, drama and essay writing. The college holds class/house tests in order to ensure that students continue to study properly. The annual examinations are conducted by the University on the basis of the syllabi conveyed to the college every year. The college results are satisfactory at the undergraduate and post-graduate level. The academic calendar is followed in letter and spirit.

Teachers are motivated to improve their professional skills by attending Orientation/Refresher courses, Conferences, Seminars and Workshops at various

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levels. Slow learners are motivated by giving personal attentions and academic counseling and advanced learners are encouraged to participate in various competitions at college, inter college and state level and also being motivated for competitive exams. The existence of the Parent Teacher Association in the college helps parents to monitor the academic progress of their wards from time to time. The college intimates to parents of all learners the marks/grades obtained by their wards in different tests. This makes teaching-learning and evaluation process effective.

Working days of the college in a year are 265 out of which the teaching days extend approximately upto 180. Every teacher is required to take a teaching load of 24 periods per week. The teachers are recruited on the recommendations of Punjab Public Service Commission, which conducts the interviews for the post of lecturers in the different state Govt. colleges. Appointment of temporary/adhoc teaching staff is made by the State Education Department. However, sometimes the Department authorises Principals of the colleges to appoint teachers on part-time basis against vacant posts in accordance with the UGC/State/University norms/guidelines so that the studies of the students do not suffer. Adhoc arrangements are made out of P.T.A Fund as guest faculty.

The college does not have any self-appraisal method to evaluate the performance of the faculty in teaching, research and examination. Every teacher fills a part of the annual confidential report proforma. So the evaluation of the lecturers is carried out by the Principal on the basis of their work and conduct, results and the columns of the self-appraisal filled up by them. Adverse report/comments are conveyed to the lecturers with a view to improving them in future.

#### Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension.

The college offers undergraduate and postgraduate programmes. Out of 40 permanent teachers of the college, 11 have Ph.D, 22 M.Phil and others are only with postgraduate degrees. However, about 12 teachers in the subject of History, Punjabi, English, Physics and Commerce have published research papers in national and international journals and have also written text books & Books on Punjabi literature & History of Lubanas. A teacher in the Department of Punjabi attended the

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International Conference in U.K. and Canada and also presented the papers and thereafter, he had published a book about his visit. The college does not provide any kind of consultancy services both at the honorary and payment level.

The extension and co-curricular activities are presently carried out by some departments and under the schemes of N.S.S. The broad areas of the various extension activities are community development, health and hygiene awareness, social work, blood donation camps, AIDS awareness, environmental awareness, Adult education etc. Presently, the college has linkages with non-government organisations to carry out jointly the extension activities.

#### **Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources.**

The college is spread over 31.5. acres of land and centrally located in Kapurthala city. However, many of its students are coming from the rural areas around the city of Kapurthala. Presently, the number of students is 1499. The numbers of permanent teachers are 40. It goes to the credit of the college that numbers of working days of the college crosses 265.

The college has insufficient number of rooms required for teaching various classes. It has required Laboratories, Library, Playground, Canteen, Girl's Common Room, Staff Room, Administrative Block, and Jubilee Hall for multi-purposes etc. The college possesses 8 computers.

The college Library has approximately 42153 books. The number of journals and periodicals subscribed by the Library is 23. The Library functions from 9 am to 4 pm on all working days except on Sundays and holidays. The college does not provide reprography & Internet facilities to the students. There is an advisory committee for the library that supervises the various activities of library.


The sports ground of the college provides facilities for many games viz. Football, Volleyball, Hockey, Handball, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Badminton, Chess, Table Tennis, Carom and Athletics. The college teams have been winning consistently the University Championship in Kho-Kho only.



The N.S.S. Programme of the college is working satisfactorily. The volunteers participate in the need based activities for the villagers and impart value based education to the people regarding the social evils like Female – Foeticide and infanticide, AIDS, illiteracy through street plays and cultural programmes. The boys and girls carry out 'shramdan', tree plantation and campaign for cleanliness and sanitation. Blood Donation Camps are also organised. The college also provides training in N.C.C. The activities of the N.C.C. are quite satisfactory. Two Cadets have participated in Republic Day Parades in New Delhi in January 2000 and 2001. Many cadets have qualified the 'B' & 'C' certificates. The name of N.C.C Officer was recommended for membership of syndicate of Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar by the Commanding Officer 21-Punjab BN N.C.C on account of his dedication and excellent record. The college brings out the Magazine named <u>Randhir</u> annually in which the students get an opportunity to develop their creativity in writing and develop their expression capabilities.

#### **Criterion V: Student Support and Progression**

The college publishes its updated prospectus in Punjabi language every year. It contains the details about the available courses, subject combinations, rules and regulations of the admission, the details of fee structure, Competitive exams, the college calendar of the year, the availability of scholarships and the various facilities available on the college campus. It is a comprehensive document that enlightens every student about the rules and regulations of the college life. The details of the financial aid and concessions available as per rules of central government and state government are mentioned. The college provides ample scope to students to participate in cultural, sports and academic events, which enables them to exhibit their talent. Outstanding sports persons are encouraged by giving them concession in admission and tuition fees, cash incentives, medals and certificates. Parent Teacher Association provides financial assistance to the meritorious and economically backward students. Subjects societies in the college conduct their functions regularly. Various social welfare programme viz. Literacy drive, awareness programmes, blood donation, Medical check up, tree plantation, Drug addiction, AIDS awareness



campaign for cleanliness and Sanitation are conducted by the NSS unit of the college. The Alumni Association is working in the college quite actively.

#### **Criterion VI: Organisation and Management**

This being Government College is controlled by the Directorate of Higher Education, Punjab State. It is cent percent funded by the government. The college Principal enjoys all powers pertaining to local administration. However, the power of transfers, award of senior scale, selection grade, study leave etc. of the employees vest with the state government. At the college level the Principal has constituted a college council headed by herself comprising five senior most faculty members. This council meets occasionally and plays an important role related to discipline, grievances of the staff, students and infrastructural developments. The Principal with the help of the heads of departments looks after the day-to-day administration and teaching for the smooth and effective academic functioning of the college. Various committees have been formed. They are directly under the control of the Principal. There is an inbuilt mechanism to coordinate and monitor the functioning of the college and financial matters.

The college accounts are audited by the Audit Department. There are no major objections and minor objections, if any, are normally removed before the next audit is done.

The college has an inbuilt mechanism to check the work efficiency of the nonteaching staff. This is done by the Office Superintendent.

The college has many welfare programmes for the teaching and non-teaching staffs e.g. there are schemes for providing different kinds of leaves to the employees. The loans are made available by the government as per rules.

There is no grievance redressal cell in the college. However, grievances are discussed by the aggrieved persons with the Principal and normally the solutions are found.



#### **Criterion VII: Healthy Practices**

The Peer Team appreciates the following healthy practices in the college

- · The college has healthy and congenial atmosphere on its campus.
- The N.S.S Volunteers impart value-based education to the people regarding the social evils like female foeticide and infanticide through street plays and cultural programmes.
- The college dispensary provides first aid to the students.
- The college is publishing annual magazine that provides scope for creativity development of the students.
- There are variety of languages i.e. Punjabi, English, Sanskrit and Hindi offered to the students, which is unique thing in this college.
- There is a healthy practice to give books free of cost from their own pocket to the hardworking and needy students by the college teachers.
- Parent-Teacher Association in the college is a unique feature.
- The college arranges debates symposium and culture events on the campus.

#### Section 3: Overall Analysis

The Peer Team after the visit to the various academic and physical facilities and interaction with the constituents of the college is pleased to acknowledge the progress made by N.J.S.A Govt. College Kapurthala in fulfilling their aims and objectives of providing higher education to the students of this region. It appreciates the efforts made by the Government to start a college in this area for the benefit of children of weaker section of the society of the area. The college has provided optimal academic and other support in providing healthy academic environment, student support and encouragement to teachers. The administration of the college is positive in approach and provides necessary support for the overall growth of the institution.

The Team appreciates the efforts made so far by the College for its academic growth and likes to commend the positive and a few areas of concern and wishes to offer the suggestions in the following pages.



## **Commendations**

- The college encourages the outstanding students by giving them incentives and support.
- The college has received the overall trophy in the zonal youth held at Guru Nanak Dev University in the year 2003-04.
- It is noteworthy that the college has successfully maintained discipline interms
  of punctuality and sincerity among teaching, non-teaching staff and students
  of the college.
- The Principal of the college has formed various committees to decentralize the administrative work and also to meet with different requirements of institution as and when they arise.
- The teaching faculty of the college is sincere to their work but comparatively speaking the teachers of the departments of History, Punjabi, English and Commerce have done commendable work in teaching, research and publication.
- A few students of Economics and Commerce departments have been securing positions in Guru Nanak Dev University continuously for the last three years.
- Two N.C.C Cadets have participated in the Republic Day Parade at New Delhi in January 2001 and 2002.
- The college is free from the scourge of ragging.
- The college has provided intercom facility to all the departments to make the teaching more effective.
- The college has significant potential in a few departments i.e. History, Punjabi and Commerce.

#### Suggestions for further growth & Development.

- It is suggested that the Government of Punjab may provide a certain degree of academic and financial autonomy to the college for its growth.
- The Government of Punjab may think to introduce P.G. Course in the subje of Punjabi and BCA as suggested by the parents, Alumni and students and they also assured for all types of help in this regard.



- Alumni Association needs to be strengthened and the meeting of the Association may be held regularly. They should also come forward to finance the students of weaker and underprivileged section of the society.
- Internet and Reprography facilities are required for the students in the Library.
- The college needs to strengthen its Career Guidance and Counseling Cell.
- The college should promote the sports activities in a true spirit.
- The college should think of setting the full-fledged departmental library & specially for Programmes/Courses
- The process of automation of office and Library may be hastened.
- The college may consider of constructing hostel for girls and boys.
- The college may make efforts to motivate its teachers to pursue for Minor/Major research projects from the U.G.C and from other different sources.
- The college may think of introducing job-oriented, market friendly or area specific courses like r-Commerce, information technology and agriculture Economics among others.
- The college needs to subscribe to standard journal and periodicals in different subjection.
- Remediate courses for educationally disadvantages and well defined and structured programmes for advanced learners need to be provided.
- The ellege needs to start immediately the process of taking feedback from studies regarding syllabiliand teaching.
- Mu. facilities need to be provided and teachers be encouraged to make greater use of Audio Visual aids in teaching.
- The concept needs to make its teachers, students and non-teaching staff computer literate. The college is advised to establish language laboratory for better learning and teaching of language and communication skills of students.
- The college may approach to concerned funding agencies to further develop sports infrastructure.
- Adequate space needs to be provided to the establishment of college. It should be fully computerized so that the students of the college may not face any difficulty.


